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CONCLUSION OF EFFECTIVE INTERNATIONAL ARRANGEMENTS TO ASSURE NON-NUCLEAR-WEAPON STATES AGAINST THE USE OR THREAT OF USE OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS

## Report of the First Committee

Rapporteur: Mr. Virgilio A, REYES (Philippines)

### I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. The item entitled "Conclusion of effective international arrangements to assure non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons" wan included in the provisional agenda of the forty-third session in accordance with General Assembly resolution 42/32 of 30 November 1987,
- 2. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 23 September 1988, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include the item in its agenda and to allocate it to the First Committee.
- 3. At its 2nd meeting, on 12 October, the kirst Committee decided to hold a general debate on the disarmament items allocated to it, namely items 51 to 69 and 139, 141 and 145, The deliberations on those items took place between the 3rd and ths 25th meetings, from 17 October to 2 November (see  $\lambda/C.1/43/PV.3-25$ ). Consideration of and action on draft resolutions on those items took place between 3 and 18 November (see  $\lambda/C.1/43/PV.26-43$ ).

## II, CONSIDERATION OF DRAFT RESOLUTION A/C.1/43/L.18

- 5. On 31 October 1988, Pakistan submitted a draft resolution entitled "Conclusion of flootive international arrangements to assure non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons" (A/C.1/43/L.18), which was introduced by its representative s' the 26th meeting, on 7 November.
- 6. At its 33rd mooting, on 10 November, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.1/43/L.18 by a recorded vote of 133 to none, with 4 abstentions (see para. 7). The voting was as followrt 2/

### III. RECOMMENDATION OF THE FIRST COMMITTEE

7. Th8 First Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolution:

# Conclusion of effective international arrangements to assure non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons

The General Arsembly,

Bearing in mind the need to allay the legitimate concern of the States of the world with regard to one nruring lasting security for their peoples,

Convinced that nuclear weapons pose the greatest throat to mankind and to the survival of civilisation.

Deeply concerned at the continuing • raaladon of the • rmr race, in particular thr nuclear-armr race, and thr possibility of thruse or threat of use of nuclear weapons,

Convinced that nuclear disarmament and the complete elimination of nuclear weapons are • rrentiaA to remove the danger of nualrar war,

Taking into account the principle of the non-use of force or threat of force • n8hrin.d in the Charter of the United Nations.

Deeply concerned about the possibility of the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons,

Recognizing that the independence, territorial integrity and sovereignty of non-nuclear-weapon States need to be safeguarded against the use or threat of use of force, including the use or threat of use of nualear weapons,

Considering that, until nualear disarmament is achieved on 8 universal basis, it is imperative for the international community to develop effective measures to ensure the security of non-nuclear-weapon Staten against the use or threat of use of nualear weapons from any quarter,

Recognizing that effective measures to assure the non-nualear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons can constitute a positive contribution to the prevention of the spread of nuclear weapons,

**Recalling** its resolution 8 3261 G (XXIX) of 9 December 1974 and 31/189 C of 21 December 1976,

Bearing in mind paragraph 59 of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, 3/ in which it urged the nuclear-weapon Staten to pursue efforts to conclude, as appropriate, effective arrangements to accure non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or throat of ume of nuclear weapons,

<u>Pesirous</u> of promoting the implementation of the relevant provisions of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session,

Recalling its resolutions 33/72 B of 14 December 1978, 34/85 of 11 December 1979, 35/155 of 12 December 1980, 36/95 of 9 December 1981, 37/81 of 9 December 1982, 38/68 of 15 December 1983, 39/58 of 12 December 1984, 40/86 of 12 December 1985, 41/52 of 3 December 1986 and 42/32 of 30 November 1987.

Eurther recalling paragraph 12 of the Declaration of the 19808 as the Second Dimarmament Decade, contained in the annex to its resolution 35/46 of 3 Deaember 1980, which states, inter alia, that all efforts should be exerted by the Committee on Dimarmament 4/ urgently to negotiate with a view to reaching agreement on effective international arrangement6 to assure non-nualear-weapon Staten against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons,

Noting the in-depth negotiations undertaken in the Conference or Disarmament and its Ad Hog Committee on Effective International Arrangements to Assure Non-Nuclear-Weapon Staten against the Use or Threat of Use of Nuclear Weapons, 5/ with a view to reaching agreement on thin item,

Noting the proposals submitted under that item in the Conference on Disarmament, including the draft8 of an international convention,

Taking note of thr decision of the Eighth Conference of Heads of State or Government of Non-Aligned Countries, held at Harare from 1 to 6 September 1986, 6/ as well as the relevant recommendations of the Organisation of the Islamic Conference reiterated in the Final Communiqué of the Seventeenth Islamic Conference of Foreign Ministers, held at Amman, Jordan, from 21 to 25 March 1988, 7/ calling upon the Conference on Disarmament to reach an urgent agreement on an international convention to assure non-auolear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons,

Further noting the support • xprerred in the Conference on Disarmament and in the General Assembly for the elaboration of an international convention to assure non-nuclear-weapon Stater against the use or throat of use of nuclear weapons, am well as the difficulties pointed out in • Volving 8 aommon approach accorptable to all,

- 1. Reaffirms the urgent need to reach agreement on ffeativo international arrangements to assure non-nualear-weapon Stater against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons;
- 2. Notes with satisfaction that in the Conference on Disarmament there is no objection, in principle, to the idea of an international convention to assure non-nualear-weapon Staten against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons, although the difficulties as difficulties = difficulties =
- 3. Appeals to all Staten, mpeaially the nuclear-weapon Stater, to demonstrate the political will necessary to reach agreement on a common approach and, in particular, on a common formula that sould be included in an international instrument of a legally binding character;
- 4. Recommends that further intensive efforts should be devoted to the search for much a common approach or common formula and that the variour alternative approaches, including, in particular, those considered in the Conference on Disarmament, should be further explored in order to overcome the difficulties;
- 5. Recommends that the Conference on Disarmament rhould actively continue negotiations with a view to reaching early agreement and concluding effective international arrangements to assure non-nuclear-weapon Staten ayainst the use or threat of ume of nuclear weapons, taking into account the

6. Decides to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-fourth session the item entitled "Conclusion of effective international arrangements to assure non-nuclear-weapon States against the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons".
