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# **REDUCTION** *OF* **MILITARY BUDGETS**

## Report of the First Committee

Rapporteur: Mr, Virgilio A, REYES (Philippines)

## I. INTRODUCTION

1. The item entitled "Reduction of military budgets" was inaluded in the provisional agenda of the forty-third session in accordance with General Assembly resolution 42/36 of 30 November 1987,

2. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 23 September 1988, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include the item in its agenda and to allocate it to the First Committee.

3. At its 2nd meeting, on 12 October, the First Conmittee decided to hold a general debate on the disarmament items allocated to it, namely items 51 to 69 and 139, 141 and 145. The deliberations on those items took place between the 3rd and the 25th meetings, from 17 October to 2 November (see A/C.1/43/PV.3-25). Consideration of and action on draft resolutions on those items took place between 3 and 18 November (see A/C.1/43/PV.26-43).

4. In connection with item 62, the First Connittee had *before* it the following documents;

(g) Letter dated 31 October 1988 from the Permnent Representative of Hungary to the United Nations addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the texts of the communiqué and the statement issued by the Committee of the Minister8 for Foreign Affairs of the Warsaw Treaty Member States on Friendship, Co-operation and Mutual Assistance at its Budapest meeting, on 28 and 29 October 1988 (A/C.1/43/7).

II. CONSIDERATION OF DRAFT RESOLUTIONS A/C.1/43/L.58 AND Rev.1

5. On 31 Oatober 1988, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Ireland. <u>Peru. Romania, Senegal</u>, <u>Sweden</u> and the <u>Union of Soviet Socialist Republics</u> submitted a draft resolution entitled "Reduction of military budgets" (A/C.1/43/L.58), which was later also sponsored by <u>Nigeria</u>. The draft resolution was introduced by the representative of Romania at the 29th meeting, on 7 November.

6. On 11 November, the sponsors submitted a revised draft resolution (A/C.1/43/L.58/Rev.1), containing the following changes:

(a) In the second preambular paragraph, the phrase "paragraph 59" was replaced by "paragraph 89";

(b) The ninth preambular paregraph, the date "1988" was replaced by "1986";

(c) Operative paragraph 4, which had read:

"Requests the Disarmament Commission to continue consideration of the item entitled 'Reduction of military budgets' and, in this context, to conclude, at its 1989 substantive session, taking into account the content of paragraph 7 as a whole, its work on the last sentence of that outstanding paragraph of the principles that should govern further actions of States in the field of freezing and reduction of military budgets, and to submit its report and recommendations to the General Assembly not later than at its forty-fourth session",

#### was revised to read:

"<u>Requests</u> the Disarmament Commission to continue consideration of the item entitled 'Reduction of military budgets' and, in this context, **to** conclude, at its 1989 substantive session, it8 work on the last outstanding paragraph of the principles that should govern further actions of States in the *field* of freesing and reduction of military budgets, and **to** rubmit its report and recommendations to thr General Assembly not later than at its forty-fourth session".

7. At its 36th meeting, on 14 November, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.1/43/L.58/Rev.1 without a vote (see para. 8).

## III. RECOMMENDATION OF THE FIRST COMMITTEE

8. The First Commitcee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolution:

## Reduction of military budgets

#### The General Assembly,

<u>Deeply concerned</u> about the ever-spiralling arms race and growing military expenditures, which constitute a heavy burden for the economies of all nations and have extremely harmful effects on world peace and security,

**Reaffirming once again the provisions** of **paragraph 89** of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session of the General Assembly, 2/ the first special session devoted to disarmament, according to which the gradual reduction of military budgets on a mutually agreed basis, for example, in absolute figures or in terms of percentage, particularly by nuclear-weapon States and other militarily significant States, would contribute to curbing the arms race and would increase the possibilities for the reallocation of resources now being used for military purposes to economic and social development, particularly for the benefit of the developing countries,

<u>Convinced</u> that the freesing and reduction of military budgets would have favourable consequences on the world eaonomia and financial situation and might facilitate efforts made to increase international assistance for the developing countries,

**Recalling** that at its twelfth speaial session, the **second** speaial session devoted to disarmament, all Member States unanimously and categorically reaffirmed the validity of the Final Document of the Tenth Special Session, as well as their solemn commitment to it,  $\underline{1}$ /

**Recalling also** that in the Declaration of the 19808 as the Second United Nations Disarmament Decade, it is provided that during this period renewed efforts should be made to reach agreement on the reduation of military expenditures and the reallocation of resources thus saved to eaonomia and social development, especially for the benefit Of developing countries, <u>4</u>/

**Recalling further the** provisions of its relevant resolutions, in which it considered that a new impetus should be given to the endeavours to achieve agreements to freeze, reduce or otherwise restrain, in a balanced manner, military expenditures, including adequate measures of verification satisfactory to all parties Concerned,

<u>Aware</u> of the various proposals submitted by Member States and of the activities carried out so far within the framework of the United Nations in the field of the reduction of military budgets,

<u>Considering</u> that the identification and elaboration of the principles that should govern further actions Of States in freezing and reducing military budgets and the other current activities within the framework of the United Nations related to the question of the reduction of military budgets should be regarded as having the fundamental objective of reaching international agreements on the reduction of military expenditures,

Noting that the Disarmament Commission, at its 1986 substantive session, agreed upon the above-mentioned principles with the exception of one outstanding paragraph on which it was generally felt that further consideration was needed,  $\underline{5}/$ 

**1.** <u>Declares again its conviction</u> that it is possible to achieve international agreements *on* the reduction of military budgets without

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prejudice to the **right of all** States **to** undiminished **security**, **self-defence** and sovereignty)

2. Appeals to all States, in particular to the most heavily armed States, pending the aonalusion of agreements On the reduction of military expenditures, to exercise self-restraint in their military expenditures with a view to reallocating the funds thus saved to economic and soaial development, particularly for the benefit of developing countries;

3. <u>Reaffirms</u> that the human and material resources released through the reduction of military expenditures aculd be reallocated for eacnomia and social development, particularly for the benefit of the developing countries;

4. <u>Requests</u> the Disarmament Commission to continue consideration of the item entitled "Reduction of military budgets" and, in this context, to conclude, at its 1989 substantive session, its work on the last outstanding paragraph of the principles that should govern further actions of States in the field of freesing and reduction of military budgets, and to submit its report and recommendations to the General Assembly not later than at its forty-fourth session;

5. Draws anew the attention of Member States to the fact that the identification and elaboration of the principles that should govern further actions of States in freesing and reducing military budgets could contribute to harmonising the views of States and creating confidence among them conducive to achieving international agreements on the reduction of military budgets;

6. <u>Urges</u> all Member States, in particular the most heavily armed States. to reinforce their readiness to co-operate in a constructive manner with a view to reaching agreements to freeze, reduce or otherwise restrain military expenditures;

7. **Decides** to include in the provisional agenda of its forty-fourth session the item entitled "Reduction of military budgets".

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
