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Coordination and cooperation

International governmental and non-governmental organizations invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups

Note by the Secretariat

1. The Commission may wish to recall that, from its forty-fourth session to fiftieth session, in 2011 to 2017, it heard oral reports by the secretariat about intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations invited to sessions of UNCITRAL.¹ At its forty-eighth session, in 2015, it requested the secretariat, when presenting its oral report on the topic of organizations invited to sessions of UNCITRAL, to provide comments on the manner in which invited organizations fulfilled the criteria applied by the secretariat in making its decision to invite non-governmental organizations.² At its forty-ninth session, in 2016, the Commission welcomed the detailed and informative report presented by the secretariat pursuant to that request.³ At its fiftieth session, in 2017, the Commission requested the secretariat to provide information about intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations invited to sessions of UNCITRAL in writing for future sessions.⁴ This note is presented pursuant to that request and covers the period since the start of the fifty-fourth session of UNCITRAL (Vienna, 28 June–16 July 2022) up to the date of this note.

3. Since the Commission's fifty-fourth session, in 2021, no new intergovernmental organization (IGO) has been added in the list of IGOs invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups.

4. The UNCITRAL secretariat considered that the following non-governmental organizations (NGOs),⁵ which had requested to be invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups, met the eligibility criteria and has therefore added them to the list of NGOs invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups:⁶ Venezuelan Arbitration Association (<https://avarbitraje.com/>); Tashkent International Arbitration Centre (www.tiac.uz); Tehran Chamber of Commerce, Industries, Mines and Agriculture (<https://cic.tecim.ir/about.aspx>); Shanghai Arbitration Commission (www.shiac.org/shiac/index_E.aspx); Conference on European Restructuring and Insolvency Law (www.ceril.eu/home); Asia Pacific Centre for Arbitration & Mediation (<https://apcam.asia>); Mid-Atlantic Caribbean Alternative Dispute Resolution Institute (<https://macadri.org/>); Shenzhen Court of International Arbitration (<http://www.scia.com.cn/en>); Silicon Valley Arbitration and Mediation Center (<https://svamc.org/>) and International Port Community Systems Association (<https://ipcsa.international/>). Other amendments were made in that list to reflect changes in the status of invitation to working groups of an organization.⁷

5. The UNCITRAL secretariat considered that the following NGOs which requested to be invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups did not meet the eligibility criteria and, therefore, it has not granted their requests:

(a) Intergovernmental Collaborative Action Fund for Excellence, Inc (ICAFE, icafe.uno) expressed an interest in participating as an observer in sessions of Working Group II (Dispute Settlement). It was not found to have a demonstrated expertise in the area of work dealt with by the Working Group; and

(b) Asian Institute of International Financial Law (<https://aiifl.law.hku.hk/>) expressed an interest in participating as an observer in sessions of Working Groups I (MSMEs) and V (Insolvency Law). It was not found to meet the criteria for admission as an international-governmental organization since academic entities are, as a general rule, not invited to meetings of UNCITRAL and its working groups.

6. In addition to the NGOs listed as being invited to Working Group III (ISDS Reform) in the list of NGOs invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups, the secretariat considered that some additional NGOs and other entities could make useful contributions to the work of that Working Group at the current stage of its deliberations. Because of the academic or trade union nature of those NGOs and other entities or because their expertise and experience are only remotely relevant to other areas of UNCITRAL's work, the secretariat was not in the position to place them in the list of NGOs invited to sessions of UNCITRAL and its working groups. They were placed on an ad hoc list of additional NGOs and other entities invited to Working Group III while it is working on issues of ISDS reform (see the table below). The need for inviting them to future sessions of the Working Group is assessed by the secretariat according to the needs of the Working Group at a given time.⁸ Since the Commission's

fifty-fourth session, in 2021, the secretariat has removed the Centre for International Law at the National University of Singapore (CIL) from the ad hoc list.

7. The additional NGOs and other entities placed on the ad hoc list are not invited to annual sessions of UNCITRAL or considered for invitation to other UNCITRAL working groups. They may however be considered for invitation to annual sessions of the Commission at which instrument(s) related to ISDS reform will be discussed.

In particular, the limited capacity of the conference room assigned to the Working Group session may require the secretariat to exercise its discretion in selecting those NGOs and other entities best meeting the criteria for invitation.
