Annotations

1. Election of officers

In accordance with rule 15 of the rules of procedure of the functional commissions of the Economic and Social Council and pursuant to Council resolution 1987/21 and decision 2002/234, the Commission on the Status of Women elects its Bureau for a two-year period. At the 1st meeting of its sixtieth session, on 20 March 2015, the Commission elected, by acclamation, Antonio de Aguiar Patriota (Brazil) as Chair for the sixtieth session, Fatmaalzahraa Hassan Abdelaziz Abdelkawy (Egypt) as Vice-Chair for the sixtieth and sixty-first sessions, and Sejla Durbuzović (Bosnia and Herzegovina) as Vice-Chair for the sixtieth session.

At its 2nd meeting, on 14 March 2016, the Commission will be called upon to elect two vice-chairs for its sixtieth and sixty-first sessions, to represent the Asia-Pacific States and the Western European and other States, respectively, and to designate one of the vice-chairs as Vice-Chair-cum-Rapporteur of the Commission at its sixtieth and sixty-first sessions.

In accordance with Economic and Social Council resolution 2009/16, the Commission appoints five of its members to serve a two-year term on the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women, established in accordance with Economic and Social Council resolution 1983/27. At the nineteenth meeting of the fifty-ninth session, on 20 March 2015, the Commission appointed China as a member of the Working Group on Communications for the sixtieth and sixty-first sessions (2016 and 2017). At its 2nd meeting, on 14 March 2016, the Commission will be called upon to appoint the four remaining members of the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women, representing their respective regional groups.

2. Adoption of the agenda and other organizational matters

Rule 7 of the rules of procedure provides that the Commission, at the beginning of each session, shall adopt the agenda of that session on the basis of the provisional agenda.

The provisional agenda and documentation for the sixtieth session of the Commission were approved by the Economic and Social Council in its decision 2015/218.

Preparations for the sixtieth session of the Commission were undertaken in accordance with Economic and Social Council resolution 2015/6 on the future organization and methods of work of the Commission on the Status of Women. Accordingly, the Bureau of the Commission held several meetings as well as informal briefings and consultations with delegations to consider the organization and methods of work for the session.

Following past practice, statements delivered by representatives of delegations of members and observers of the Commission during general discussions shall be limited to 5 minutes, and statements made on behalf of groups of delegations to 10 minutes. It is also recommended that interventions from non-governmental organizations on themes relevant to the session be integrated into the general discussion and the interactive expert panels, taking into consideration geographical balance.

3. **Follow-up to the Fourth World Conference on Women and to the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly, entitled “Women 2000: gender equality, development and peace for the twenty-first century”**
- (a) **Implementation of strategic objectives and action in critical areas of concern and further actions and initiatives:**
 - (i) **Priority theme: women’s empowerment and the link to sustainable development;**
 - (ii) **Review theme: the elimination and prevention of all forms of violence against women and girls**

In its resolution 2013/18, the Economic and Social Council decided that at its sixtieth session, in 2016, the Commission would consider as its priority theme “Women’s empowerment and the link to sustainable development” and also decided that it would consider as its review theme “The elimination and prevention of all forms of violence against women and girls”, in follow-up to the agreed conclusions adopted by the Commission at its fifty-seventh session (see [E/2013/27-E/CN.6/2013/11](#)).

In its resolution 2015/6, the Council decided that the session of the Commission would include a ministerial segment to reaffirm and strengthen political commitment to the realization of gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls as well as their human rights and to ensure high-level engagement and the visibility of the deliberations of the Commission, and that the segment would include ministerial round tables or other high-level interactive dialogues to exchange experiences, lessons learned and good practices, as well as a general discussion on the follow-up to the Fourth World Conference on Women and to the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly.

Also in its resolution 2015/6, the Council decided that the Commission would evaluate progress in the implementation of the agreed conclusions on a priority theme of a previous session as its review theme, through an interactive dialogue that includes:

(a) Member States of different regions, on a voluntary basis, presenting their lessons learned, challenges and best practices that identify means for accelerated implementation through national and regional experiences;

(b) Ways to support and achieve accelerated implementation, including through addressing data gaps and challenges in the enhanced collection, reporting, use and analysis of data with regard to the theme, at the national, regional and global levels.

Ministerial segment

Further to consultations by the Chair, a series of ministerial round tables or other high-level interactive dialogues will be held during the sixtieth session of the Commission, in addition to the general discussion.

Interactive expert panels on the priority theme

The Commission will hold two interactive expert panels with the participation of experts from governments, the United Nations system, civil society and other stakeholder groups that work on the priority theme.

Interactive dialogue on the review theme

The Commission will hold two interactive dialogues with voluntary presentations by Member States from different regions, and one interactive expert dialogue on the review theme.

(b) Emerging issues, trends and new approaches to issues affecting the situation of women or equality between women and men

In its resolution 2015/6, the Economic and Social Council determined that the Commission would, as necessary, continue to discuss emerging issues, trends, focus areas and new approaches to questions affecting the situation of women, including equality between women and men, that require timely consideration, taking into account developments at the global and regional levels as well as planned activities within the United Nations, where increased attention to gender perspectives is required, and with attention to relevant issues on the agenda of the Council, in particular its annual main theme, as applicable.

In the same resolution, the Council requested the Bureau of the Commission, prior to the session, to identify such an emerging issue, trend, focus area or new approach, in consultation with all Member States, through their regional groups, and taking into account inputs from other relevant stakeholders, for consideration by the Commission through an interactive dialogue.

Following consultations, it was agreed that no emerging issue would be identified for the sixtieth session.

(c) Gender mainstreaming, situations and programmatic matters

Normative aspects of the work of the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women

In accordance with paragraph 67 (c) of General Assembly resolution 64/289, the Commission will have before it the annual report of the Under-Secretary-General/Executive Director of the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN-Women) on the normative aspects of the work of UN-Women and on its implementation of the policy guidance provided by the Commission.

Situation of and assistance to Palestinian women

In its resolution 2015/13 on the situation of and assistance to Palestinian women, the Economic and Social Council requested the Commission to continue to monitor and take action with regard to the implementation of the Nairobi Forward-looking

Strategies for the Advancement of Women, in particular paragraph 260 concerning Palestinian women and children, the Beijing Platform for Action and the outcomes of the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly. It also requested the Secretary-General to continue to review the situation, to assist Palestinian women by all available means and to submit to the Commission at its sixtieth session a report, including information provided by the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia, on the progress made in the implementation of the resolution.

Release of women and children taken hostage, including those subsequently imprisoned, in armed conflicts

In its resolution 58/1, the Commission on the Status of Women requested the Secretary-General to submit to the Commission at its sixtieth session a report on the implementation of the resolution, including relevant practical recommendations, taking into account the information provided by States and relevant international organizations.

Women, the girl child and HIV and AIDS

In its resolution 58/3, the Commission on the Status of Women requested the Secretary-General to submit a report to the Commission at its sixtieth session on the implementation of the resolution, with an emphasis on accelerated actions taken in regard to women, the girl child and HIV and AIDS, in accordance with the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development, and the Political Declarations on HIV and AIDS, using information provided by Member States, the organizations and bodies of the United Nations system and non-governmental organizations, with a view to assessing the impact of the resolution on the well-being of women and the girl child.

Violence against women

In its resolution 50/166 on the role of the United Nations Development Fund for Women (now UN-Women) in eliminating violence against women, the General Assembly requested the Fund to include in its regular reports information on the establishment of a trust fund in support of national, regional and international actions to eliminate violence against women and to provide such information to the Commission.

Future multi-year programme of work of the Commission on the Status of Women

In its resolution 2013/18, the Economic and Social Council requested the Commission at its sixtieth session to decide on its future multi-year programme of work and requested the Secretary-General to submit to the Commission, at its sixtieth session, a report containing proposals on the Commission's priority themes for future sessions.

Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women

In accordance with article 21.2 of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women, the reports of the Committee on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women are transmitted to the Commission for its information.

4. Communications concerning the status of women

In its resolution 76 (V), the Economic and Social Council established a procedure by which the Commission would receive and consider communications relating to the status of women. In its resolution 304 I (XI), the Council amended resolution 76 (V) and requested the Secretary-General to compile, before each session of the Commission, a list of confidential and non-confidential communications, containing a brief indication of the substance of each communication.

In its resolution 1983/27, the Council reaffirmed the mandate of the Commission to consider confidential and non-confidential communications on the status of women and authorized the Commission to appoint a working group to consider such communications and prepare a report thereon for the Commission.

In its resolution 1993/11, the Council reaffirmed that the Commission was empowered to make recommendations to the Council on what action should be taken on emerging trends and patterns of discrimination against women revealed by such communications.

In its decision 2002/235, the Council decided, in order to make the communications procedure of the Commission more effective and efficient:

(a) That the Commission, starting at its forty-seventh session, should appoint, at each session, the members of the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women for the next session so that the members would be able to meet to enable the Secretariat to issue their report three working days before the adoption of the agenda by the Commission;

(b) To request the Secretary-General:

(i) To inform Governments about each communication pertaining to them that would be considered by the Commission and give them at least 12 weeks before the consideration of such communications by the Working Group;

(ii) To ensure that the members of the Working Group receive in advance the lists of communications, including replies from Governments, if any, to be taken into account in preparing its report for examination by the Commission.

In its resolution 2009/16, the Economic and Social Council decided that the Commission, starting at its fifty-fourth session, should appoint the members of the Working Group on Communications on the Status of Women for a two-year period.
