#### I. INTRODUCTION

- In resolution 42/113 of 7 December 1997 on the "International campaign he will drug abuse and illicit trafficking", the General Assembly heroseodanew her
- 2. The present document has boon prepared in response to the General Assembly's request for a report on the implementation of the resolution.

# II, ACTION TAKEN BY THE COMMISSION ON NARCOTIC DRUGS AND THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL

- 3. At it8 tenth special session, hold from 8 to 19 February 1988, 1/thr Commission on Narcotic Drugs, in addition to adopting four resolutions and nine decisions, approved a series Of draft resolutions for submission to the Economic and Social Council. Thr Council subsequently adopted these On 25 May 1998,  $\bullet$  8 resolutions 1988/8 to 1988/15. 2/
- 4. The first two rerolutions dealt respectively with "Preparation of an international convention  $\bullet$   $\gamma_0 \spadesuit \mathcal{H} = 0$  illicittrafficimarcotic drug and psychotropic substances"  $\bullet$  == with the "International Conference on Drug Abuse and Illicit Trefficking". 1/
- 5. The next four resolutions dealt with "Demand and supply of opiates for medical and scientific purposes", "Co-ordination of drug control ativitire in the African region", "Reduction of th8 illicit supply of drugs" and "Strengthening of co-operation and ao-ordination in international drug control", which consolidated recommendations from the three regional meetings of Heads of National Drug Law Enforcement Agencies (HONLEA).
- 6. By resolution 1988/14, the Economic and Social Council decided that the Sub-Commission on Illicit Drug Traffic and Related Matters in the Near and Middle East should continue to meet annually at a capital in the region, whenever possible, and at the United Nations Office at Vienna prior to sessions of the Commission On Narcotic Drugs. It also without the sub-Commission, and ording the membership of Egypt, India and Jordan,
- 7. by resolution 1988/15, ntitled "Meetings of Heads of National Drug Law Enforcement Agencies, Asia and the Pacific, Africa, and Latin America and the Caribbean", the Economic and Social Counail, inter alia, requested the Secretary-General to convene these three regional meetings annually, beginning in 1988, except in years when an interregional meeting is hold.

- 8. by resolution 1988/16 on "Improved measures for reduction of illicit drmrnd for narcotic druqr and psychotropic substances", the Economic and Social Council urged all Governments to foster that best possible conditions for the healthy development of all young people and for a purposeful life for thorn by facilitating their integration into the community. It called upon the Governments of countries facing problems of drug abuse to take, when appropriate, the necessary measures to reduce significantly the illicit demand.
- The Commirrion on Narcotic Drugs, at it8 trnth special session, devoted special attention to the level of the resources available to the Division of Narcotic Drugs red the secretariat of th8 International Narcotics Control Board. Thr Commission heard a statement in which the Director-General of the United Nations Office at Vienna and Co-ordfurtor of all United Nations drug-related activities • Xpr0880d her deep concern about the budgetary and staffing situation of these bodies. After thorough discussion, the Commission concluded "that any reduction below the approved total appropriation for section 20 of the programme budget for the biennium 1986-1987 relating to the International Narcotics Control Board and the Division of Narcotic Druge would be irreconcilable with the efforts of Governments and the United Nations to intensify the global struggle abuse". In an unprecedented decision, the Commission requested it8 Chrimmen and the President of the International Narcotics Control Board to bring these conclusions in person to th8 attention of the Secretary-General. The Commission's delegation was received by the Secretary-General on 25 February 1988. The Commirrion also recommended "to the Committee for Programme and Co-ordination that in examining the international drug control programmes it should give due regard to tho present resolution with a view to maintaining and possibly strengthening the level of resources available to thr drug control units",

#### III. ACTION BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

- 10. In response to the General Assembly's request, thr United Nations Development Programme, in co-operation with the United Nations Fund for Drug Abuse Control, organized the first seminar on replacement of opium poppy cultivation in December 1987, with the participation of experts from Burma, Pakistan and Thailand, Observers from Australia, the United Stat.8 of America, the Commirrien of the European Communities and The Colombo Plan Bureau also attended. Other seminars are in the planning stage.
- 11. The Division of Narcotic Drugs, in co-operation with interested intergovernmental bodies and national agencies, is in the process Of identifying sources of expertise for intensified drug law nforcom8nt training. To oo-ordinate such training activities, the Division is collecting national and international data and has already published the first issue of a biannual "International Calendar of Druy Law Enforcement Training Events", covering the period from July to December 1988. With the co-operation of a broad cross-section of national drug law enforcement agencies, as well as Interpol and the Customs Co-operation Council, the Division has also initiated a revision Of two training manuals originally issued in the early 19708.

- 12. Oa behalf of the Secretary-General, the Division convened three regional meetings of the Heads of National Drug Law Enforcement Agencies (HONLEA) in 1988: the second mooting of HONLEA, Africa, at Dakar from 1b to 22 Ayril 1988; the second meeting of HONLEA, Latin America d the Caribbean, at Lima from 12 to 16 September 1988; and the fourteenth meeting of HONLEA, Asia d the Pacific, at Bangkok from 3 to 7 October 1988.
- 13, Further miglar of ration taken, in connection with rprincing efforts to ddrrr drug demand, include the preparation of a project on the rtablirhmont Of an international drug abuse a sessment system, to improve the quality Of information available to intergovernmental bodies. Preparatory work has also begun on several regional workshops, programmed for 1989, on the use of community resources for preventing and reducing drug abuse. In addition to ongoing programmes Of 88i8tanCO through specialised training, reference samples, manuals and qUipmOnt, special efforts are being made, with the rupport of the United Nations Fund for Drug Abuse Control, to help develop a network of national and regional laboratories for drug analysis d identification on the African continent.
- 14. The Department of Public Information of the Secretariat was requested by the General Assembly to publish information designed  $t \circ prevent$  the abuse of drugs, 8pOOiB11y by young people. In this connection, the Department issued and distributed a backgrounder urging the observance of the first annual International Dry against Drug Abuse to schools, youth group8 and other organisations. It sponsored, with thr New York NOO Committee on Narcotics and Substance Abuse, two programmes to mark the Day, including a public awareness • voat against drug abuse, torturing thr participation of young people. A number of United Nations information centres carried out publicity on the observance in their areas. In addition. Several public service • nounewwatr for television urging rupport of United Nations drug abuse activities were produced, as were two radio programmes on drug abuse prevention. An o rhibit of award-winning cartoons against drug abuse war mounted in the Headquarters public lobby, The Department ● n8ur.d thr availability of information on United Nations activities in the field of drug abuse and illicit trafficking, including reprints of the Comprehensive Multidisciplinary Outline and ths Declaration of the International Conference on Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking. The Department's regular television, radio and print activities included coverage of United Nations activities in this field. Information naourrgiag the prevention of drug abuse will continue to be included in future activities,
