ADDRESS EY MR. GUIDO de MARCO, PREEIDEAT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBEY AT TES PORTY-FIFTH 8Es8IOSI

Thepregrowir: I should like, fisst of ell, to thank the members of thise Organisation for unanimously electing me President of the General Assesbly at its Eorty-Eifth session. In this regard, I wiah to thank especially the mamber countrioa of the Group of Wostorn Buropean and other States who have ondorsed and put Eorward my sominatioa.

In passing me the gavel, my distinguished prodecessor, Mr. Josoph Ganven Garba, has signalled an ond to a successful forty-fourth sossion of the General dasambly, over which he presided with diplomatic skill and wisdom, contributing the dimension of africa, with all its achiovements and aspirations, and the major role which it has played, and will furcher play, in shaping the destinies of mankind. On your bohalf I wish to thank him for the work which ho has done throughout his tonure of office.

In electing se to the presidency you have bestowed on my country, Malta, and on me personaliy, a great honour and reaponsibility. The confidence which you have placed in ase and ay country underlines the Charter of the Unitad Nations wherein "we, the psogies of the United macions" express our determination to reaffirm faith in the equml righte of nations, large and amall. For all nations, large and amall, have a role and an interast in maintaining peace and security and in taking collective maasures for the provention and removal of threats to the peace, and for the uppression of acte of aggression.

The Anternational commanty's commitwont to the principle of the sovereign equality of all its Manbers is for all States, but in particular for the mall scates, the guarantee against the threat or use of force against their integrity asd indopendence.

The preginent: I have great pleasure in welconing the Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Principality of Liechtenstein. Mr. Hans Brunhart, and inviting bim to addreas the General Assembly.

Mre Brominit (Liechtenstein) (interprotation Erom Fronch): I should like so begin ty acdreseing to you, 8ir, all my good wishoc on your election to the prosidency of the United Nations Genoral Aasembly at its forty-fifth seasion. My delegation is convinced that your wealth of experience will onable you to provide oxcellent guidance for the future work of the Assembly.

I mould like to thank you for youx warm welcome. I would also like to take this opyortunity to axpress my gratitude to the members of the security council.

wino uegnimousiy mupported the admiseton of Liechtenstein te membership of the Deited Tations. I ahould particulariy ilke to thank the delsgetion of Austria and all those that supported the draft resolution submitted by Austria on the admission of Liechtensteln, as wwil as all those countries that, during today's meating, spoke in favour of my councry's sequest for admission.

This day is very mpecial one, and for me personaliy it is a very moving occaslon to bo able to esprege to you, gir, and to the mombers of the Assembly the gratitude of the principality of Liechtenstein for the boundiess confidence which has been gieced in my country by adaitting it to membershig of the organisation. Through their assent, the Mamber States of the United Mations have made it known that Liechtenstein is to take its proper place in the comanaity of nations and that thoy are convinced thet oven a small country can make ite contribution to internationsl co-operation as an sgual partner. On this occasion of guch paramount inportance for my country, I shoula also like to convey to the Assembly the best wishes of the ruling Prince, Hans-Adam II of Liechtenstein, for whom the adimision of our country to the United Nations was a personal desire and a matter of political pelority, as wil as that of the paple of Liechtenstein.

Today, the Principality of Liechtenstein has become the 160th Meaber State of Che Uaited Mations. Liechtenstein has existed as on indopendent state for almont 200 years. We enjoy aprivileged situation, Liechtenstein is a prosperous state. It has excellent and close relations with its two noighbouring states, 8witzerland and Austria. The cossolidation and preservation of ite sovereignty and the developmeat of good noighbourly relations have boon the main purposes of the Eoreign policy of Liechtenstein. Fevertheless, Liechtenstein has not failed to be affected by curreat problems. I only need to rafor to the poliution of the environment, which respects no frontiors and which has equaliy affacted Liechtengtein. This Eingle example iliustrates to what extent regional and intereational co-operation are indispensable.

For Liechtenstain, edmission to the Daited Hations represente univerani recognition of its efforts to co-operate and to help astablizh and maintain peace and create a better world. For many yoars. Liechtenstein has been foilowing clomely and with great reapect the sucreasful achievoments of the Unitad Mations. beaded by ite Eecretary-General. Mr. Perez do Cuellar, as negotlator in both regional and international conflicts. Since the establiohment of the United Wations thore has rarely beon a time whan article 1 of tive Unitod Mations Charter has been as relevant as it has beon recentiy.

A small country like the Principality of Liechtensteln, which, internationaliy spenking, cannot rely on power, but solely on the law, quite noturally if concerned that thero be respect for and application of international public lav as woll as the renceful extylement of Aigputem and international co-operation. That is why the International Court of Juntice, as the leading legal organ of the Unfted Whilons, has particular value in the yes of Liechtenstein, which joince that body as eariy as 1950. In the context of the United Mations, my country has been

invoived in drawing up multilateral treaties and han in recent years become a contracting party to growing number of them.

We now are witnoselng very rapid changes in Europe, changes quite unthinkabla ouly a yoar or two ago. The Principality of Liechtonstoin, which is geographically situated in the vary beart of Euroje, has bean able to follow these changes very closely. Even a amall country can contribute, beyond the frontiers of lta own state, to the process of social transformation. To the eztent of its possibilities. Liochtonstein has andeavoured to make acceas to market economies eacier for the countries of Contral and Eastern Europe. Currontif this has taken the form of a specific project in the field of education and by the participation of the Principality of Liechtenstoin in tine recently created European Bank for Reconstruction and Developmant. Purthermore, at present the Council of Burope, of which our country han beon a sember since 1978, provides states of Central and Eatern Europe with an opportunity to participate in tie oleost political forum in Europe. In the Council of Europe. Liechtensteln supporte the efforts to make it posaible for those countriea to beome integraced is accordance with the dumocratic objectives and principles of Western Europe.

In the contezt of worth-South problame, Liechtenstein has sought to domonetrate ite solidarity by timely develuzwoni ald, by supporting and paying close aftextion to apecific projecte. Furthermore, hiechtenstoin ian ondeavourad to contribute through cevelopment aid for refugees and diaseter gituations through Ats participation in international ald programes of the International Comaletec of the xod Crose and the office of the Uaicen Mations Righ Comizaionor fox foilugens.

The Principsity of Liechtenstein mas for many yoars maintained relations with the Vnited Mations and various apecialised agoncies, After joining the International Court of Justice in 1950, there followed admitsion to che Univarial

Postal Wilon, the Iriternational Atomic Emorgy Agoncy and che Rorli Organisation for Intellectual Property. Liechtenmein is also amber of the Uaited Bations Conference on Trade and Developmont and has since 1976 enjoyed consultative status with the Economic Comiseion for Iurope.

The relationahigs which hava existed botween the Principality of Liechtoastein and the United Hucions over tho gears have tocay cuiminated in its admisaion te full mabership. On this occasion, I ahould liks to take this opportundty once again to ompasise that my country fully onderues the principlea sot forth in the Charter. The conflict in the Gulf ragion, it bellowe, tully bear: out the prime importance of the main goal of the United vackose, that ia, to guarentee peace in the world as well as intermational socurity end, to that ond, to take offective and collective meanuras.

Once egain, I should like to express my gratitude for che groat honour which today has been bestowed upon the princlgality of Liechtenstein by admitting it to membership of the Uniced Mations. Members may sest asaured that Liechteastein uill ondenvour in so far as possible to make constructive contribution to the wask of the United Mations.

Mr. President. I should like to thank you and to wish the forty-sigth eession of the General desembly a vary frultful outcome.
