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The meeting was called to order at 3.25 p.m.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

The PRESIDENT: I apologise for the delay in starting the meeting this afternoon. I am sure everybody appreciates that we are racing against time to see that all documents are ready for the last meeting in this period of the session. I hope we shall finish today.

EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY ON THE CYCLONE IN SAMOA

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Before we turn to the first item on our agenda for this meeting, may I on behalf of all the members of the Assembly extend our deepest sympathy to the Government and the people of Samoa on the tragic loss of life and extensive material damage which have resulted from the recent cyclone.

May I also express the hope that the international community will show its solidarity and respond promptly and generously to any request for help.

**Mr. MAUALA (Samoa):** My delegation wishes to express our deeply felt gratitude and sincere thanks to you and to all the members of the General Assembly for the sympathy you have just expressed to our Government and people with regard to cyclone Val. This will be conveyed to them and we know this expression of international solidarity will be a source of comfort and consolation to them.

While at this time we do not yet know the full extent of the damage done, we are aware that cyclone Val, which began its dreadful destruction on 6 December, has left utter devastation in its wake. Reports from those who have flown over the area have said that the extent of the damage is beyond belief and, in fact, the entire country has been hit with such tremendous force that the results have been catastrophic.

The damage and destruction have been so severe and widespread that, according to initial estimates, 80 to 90 per cent of all housing has been badly damaged or destroyed and there has been wholesale destruction of hospitals, schools and other public buildings, including our main post office and other essential government buildings and facilities. We are not yet aware of all the casualties but understand that there have been many deaths and injuries as a result of the cyclone. The majority of the population are without shelter, food or clean water. Recent reports indicate that 100 per cent of our food crops have been destroyed.

Cyclone Val is all the more a crushing blow for us as we are still in the process of rehabilitation from cyclone Ofa of February 1990. With the help of the international community and mammoth efforts on the part of the Government a great deal of progress had been made. This has now all been swept away by

this cyclone, which from accounts is at least 50 per cent more devastating than cyclone Ofa was, resulting in massive damage to our painstakingly rebuilt infrastructure.

However, the Samoan Government and people, we know, will not allow this set-back to daunt them and will face the overwhelming task of rebuilding once again, strengthened by the help of God and the support and generosity of the international community. We wish to sincerely thank all those countries and organizations that have already come to our aid, particularly our neighbours Australia and New Zealand, which flew in emergency supplies just as soon as it was possible. The response of all our friends in the international community has been swift and generous and for this we are profoundly grateful.

Our neighbour, American Samoa, has also suffered greatly from cyclone Val and our thoughts and prayers go to our brothers and sisters there as well.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Regarding the remaining two vacancies, I intend to hold further consultations with the Asian and Eastern European States; therefore, I propose that the Assembly keep this

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): If I hear no objection, I shall consider that the General Assembly agrees to this candidate.

It was so decided.

The President (interpretation from Arabic): This concludes this stage of our consideration of agenda item 18 (h).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I call on the Rapporteur of the Fifth Committee, Mr. Mahmoud Barimani, to present the reports of the Fifth Committee in one intervention.

Mr. BARIMANI (Islamic Republic of Iran), Rapporteur of the Fifth Committee: As Rapporteur of the Fifth Committee, I have the honour of appearing before the General Assembly, under your presidency, Sir, to introduce the Committee's reports on agenda items allocated to it.

You will recall, Sir, that 25 agenda items were allocated to the Fifth Committee in your letter to the Chairman of the Committee dated 20 September 1991. In addition, agenda item 146, "Financing of the United Nations Advance Mission in Cambodia", was allocated to the Fifth Committee on 4 November 1991.

From 24 September to 20 December 1991 the Fifth Committee held 57 formal meetings and 64 informal consultations. I shall now give a brief report on the result of the Fifth Committee's work.

The Fifth Committee's report on agenda item 12, "Report of the Economic and Social Council", is contained in document A/46/794. In paragraph 4 of its report the Committee recommends that the General Assembly adopt a draft decision taking note of chapters I, IV (section F) and VII (sections B and D) of the report of the Economic and Social Council.

The Fifth Committee's report on agenda item 104, "Financial reports and audited financial statements, and reports of the Board of Auditors", appears in document A/46/792. In paragraph 10 of this report the Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of a draft resolution which was adopted by the Committee without a vote.

The Fifth Committee's report on agenda item 105, "Review of the efficiency of the administrative and financial functioning of the United Nations", is contained in document A/46/817. Under this item the Committee recommends adoption of the draft resolution in paragraph 8 and the draft decision in paragraph 9.

The report of the Fifth Committee contained in document A/46/807 relates to agenda item 106, "Programme budget for the biennium 1990-1991". In this report the Committee recommends to the Assembly the adoption of the draft resolutions in paragraph 3 and the draft decisions in paragraph 4.

With regard to agenda item 107, "Proposed programme budget for the biennium 1992-1993", the report of the Fifth Committee is to be found in the five sections of document A/46/830.

The report of the Fifth Committee on agenda item 108, "Programme planning", is contained in document A/46/800, and the pertinent draft resolution appears in paragraph 41.

The Fifth Committee's report in document A/46/793 relates to agenda item 111, "Administrative and budgetary coordination of the United Nations with the specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency". Under this agenda item the Committee recommends adoption of a draft decision, which appears in paragraph 6 of the report.

On agenda item 112, "Joint Inspection Unit", the Committee recommends that an in-depth discussion of the annual reports of the Joint Inspection Unit for 1990 to 1991 and 1991 to 1992 be conducted at the forty-seventh session of the General Assembly and that at the same session the Assembly consider the desirability and possibility of biennializing this agenda item in the context of the ongoing efforts to improve the work of the Fifth Committee. The Committee's report on this agenda item is contained in document A/46/781.

Agenda item 113, "Pattern of conferences", was thoroughly reviewed by the Committee, which has presented a draft resolution for approval by the General Assembly in its report in document A/46/815 of 19 December 1991. While covering a wide range of issues related to conference servicing, the draft resolution reflects the constant search for optimum utilization of conference services and recommends a number of measures to achieve that goal.

Agenda item 114, "Scale of assessments for the apportionment of the expenses of the United Nations", was perhaps one of the most critical items

the Committee had to tackle, since it directly determined the financial future of the Organization. Although the negotiation process was extremely arduous and time consuming, the Committee experienced many of its finest moments in building a delicate and balanced compromise package and adopting it by consensus. The relevant draft resolution for approval by the General Assembly is contained in the Committee's report in document A/46/818.

Considerable effort was also devoted to an attempt to achieve a consensus on agenda item 115, "Personnel questions". The Committee was, however, not able to complete its work and recommends to the General Assembly that the item be kept under review and that it be dealt with at a later stage of the forty-sixth session.

Agenda item 116, "United Nations common system", and agenda item 117, "United Nations pension system", were reviewed together by the Committee owing to the linkage between the two items. Given the importance of these two items for the common systems, the Committee carefully reviewed every aspect of the issues and again came to a consensus conclusion, as reflected in the two relevant draft resolutions contained, respectively, in the Committee's reports in documents A/46/808 and A/46/816 and submitted to the General Assembly for its approval.

Regarding the agenda items on the financing of the United Nations peace-keeping and related operations, the Committee recommends for adoption by the General Assembly six draft resolutions, which are contained in documents A/46/819, A/46/820, A/46/821, A/46/822 and A/46/823, respectively. These draft resolutions cover the following agenda items: 118 (a), "United Nations Disengagement Observer Force (UNDOF)"; 118 (b), "United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL)"; 120, "United Nations Angola Verification Mission

(UNAVEM)"; 122, "United Nations Observer Group in Central America (UNOCA)"; 136 (a), "United Nations Iraq-Kuwait Observation Mission (UNIKOM)" and 146, "United Nations Advance Mission in Cambodia (UNAMIC)".

The Committee recommends that the remaining agenda items on peace-keeping and related operations be deferred to a later stage of the forty-sixth session of the General Assembly. Those items are: 109, "Current financial crisis of the United Nations"; 110, "Financial emergency of the United Nations"; 119, "Financing of the United Nations Iran-Iraq Military Observer Group (UNIMOG)"; 121, "Financing of the United Nations Transition Assistance Group (UNTAG)"; 123, "Administrative and budgetary aspects of the financing of the United Nations peace-keeping operations"; 138, "Financing of the United Nations Mission for the Referendum in Western Sahara (MINURSO)" and 139, "Financing of the United Nations Observer Mission in El Salvador (ONUSAL)".

The Committee completed its work on agenda item 18, "Appointments to fill vacancies in subsidiary organs and other appointments", and has reported the result in its reports in documents A/46/809, A/46/810, A/46/811, A/46/812, A/46/813 and A/46/814.

It is well known that the Fifth Committee always finishes its work somewhat behind schedule. I wish to point out that, in addition to the fact that the Fifth Committee has to tackle a heavy and ever-increasing workload, the Committee deeply cherishes its traditional achievement of consensus, which is a time-consuming and often difficult but, when achieved, extremely rewarding process. This is important to all the delegations on the Committee, and we are proud that consensus has been achieved on all the decisions taken by the Committee this year.

"When the same draft resolution is considered in a Main Committee and in plenary meeting, a delegation should, as far as possible, explain its vote only once, that is, either in the Committee or in plenary meeting unless that delegation's vote in plenary meeting is different from its vote in the Committee."

May I also remind Members that, still in accordance with decision 34/401, explanations of vote are limited to 10 minutes and should be made by delegations from their seats.

Before we begin to take action on the recommendations contained in the reports of the Fifth Committee, I should like to advise representatives that we are going to proceed to take decisions in the same manner as was done in the Fifth Committee.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly has thus concluded its consideration of agenda item 112.

Mr. Kenshiroh Akimoto, Mr. David Etuket, Mr. John Fox, Mr. Ion Gorita, Mr. Imre Karbuczky and Mr. Vanu Gopala Menon.

May I take it that it is the wish of the Assembly to appoint those persons?

It was so decided.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I invite members now to turn their attention to the report of the Fifth Committee (A/46/811) on agenda item 18 (c), entitled "Appointment of a member of the Board of Auditors". In paragraph 4 of that report the Fifth Committee recommends that the General Assembly should appoint the Comptroller and Auditor-General of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland as a member of the Board of Auditors for a three-year term of office beginning on 1 July 1992.

May I take it that the Assembly wishes to approve that appointment?

It was so decided.

Draft resolution C was adopted (resolution 46/184 C).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We shall now turn to four draft decisions contained in paragraph 4 of the report.

Draft decision III was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Lastly, we turn to draft decision IV, concerning the revised estimates under Income section 3.

The Fifth Committee recommends the adoption of this draft decision. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do so?

Draft decision IV was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We have concluded our consideration of agenda item 106.

We turn now to the report of the Fifth Committee (A/46/830) on agenda item 107, "Proposed programme budget for the biennium 1992-1993".

(The President)

The Assembly will take decisions on the four draft resolutions recommended in paragraph 7 of the Fifth Committee's report. At the moment, these draft resolutions are contained in document A/C.5/46/L.18 (part IV) and Corr. 1.

The Fifth Committee adopted this draft resolution without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution I was adopted (resolution 46/185 A, B and C).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We turn now to draft resolution II, entitled "Programme budget for the biennium 1992-1993".

The Fifth Committee adopted draft resolution II without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution II was adopted (resolution 46/186 A, B and C).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We now turn to draft resolution III, entitled "Unforeseen and extraordinary expenses for the biennium 1992-1993".

Draft resolution III was adopted by the Fifth Committee without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution III was adopted (resolution 46/187).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Finally, we turn to draft resolution IV, which deals with the Working Capital Fund for the biennium 1992-1993.

Draft resolution IV was also adopted by the Fifth Committee without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution IV was adopted (resolution 46/188).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I now call on the representative of the Netherlands, who wishes to make a statement in explanation of position.

Mr. SPAANS (Netherlands): The Netherlands delegation has the honour to speak on behalf of the 12 member States of the European Community on a draft resolution that the General Assembly has just adopted without a vote, concerning the programme budget for 1992-1993.

The Twelve are pleased that it has been possible to adopt this draft resolution through intensive negotiations that were held in a spirit of

cooperation and compromise. We believe that the United Nations is well served by the process through which we have adopted this draft resolution.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The General Assembly has concluded its consideration of agenda item 107.

The Assembly will take a decision on the draft resolution recommended in paragraph 41 of the report.

The Fifth Committee adopted this draft resolution without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

The draft resolution was adopted (resolution 46/189).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The General Assembly has concluded its consideration of agenda item 108.

The General Assembly will now consider the report of the Fifth Committee (A/46/815) on agenda item 113, entitled "Pattern of conferences".

The Assembly will take a decision on the draft resolution recommended by the Fifth Committee in paragraph 7 of its report.

The Fifth Committee adopted the draft resolution without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

The draft resolution was adopted (resolution 46/190).

If these two draft resolutions had been put to a vote, we would have voted against them, in accordance with the position of principle we have expressed in the General Assembly, to the effect that the two forces should be financed by the occupying Power whose aggression led to their creation.

The PRESIDENT: I request the Rapporteur of the Second Committee, Mr. Martin Rakotonaivo, to present the reports of the Second Committee in one intervention.

**Mr. RAKOTONALIVO** (Madagascar), Rapporteur of the Second Committee (interpretation from French): I have the honour to present the report of the Second Committee (A/46/727 and Add.2) on agenda item 12, entitled "Report of the Economic and Social Council".

In paragraph 41 of document A/46/727 the Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of five draft resolutions. Draft resolutions II, IV and V were adopted without a vote, while recorded votes were taken on draft resolutions I and III.

In paragraph 42 of document A/46/727 the Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of three draft decisions, which it adopted without a vote.

In document A/46/727/Add.2, the Second Committee's recommendations are contained in paragraphs 33 and 34.

In paragraph 33 the Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of three draft resolutions, which it adopted without a vote, and in paragraph 34 it recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of three draft decisions, which it also adopted without a vote.

I turn now to agenda item 77 (a), entitled "Development and international economic cooperation: trade and development". In paragraph 40 of the report of the Second Committee (A/46/645/Add.2), the Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of eight draft resolutions. In paragraph 41 it recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of a draft decision.

(Mr. Rakotonalivo, Rapporteur,

With the exception of draft resolution IV, entitled "Economic measures as a means of political and economic coercion against developing countries", on which the Second Committee took a recorded vote, all the draft proposals contained in the report were adopted without a vote.

The General Assembly also has before it the Second Committee's report (A/46/645/Add.6) on agenda item 77 (e), entitled "Development and international economic cooperation: environment". In paragraph 39 of the report, the Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of three draft resolutions. Draft resolutions I and III were adopted without a vote, while a recorded vote was taken on draft resolution II. In paragraph 40 the Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of three draft decisions, which it adopted without a vote.

Finally, the General Assembly has before it document A/46/732, containing the Second Committee's report on agenda item 82, "Operational activities for development". In paragraph 28 of the report the Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of a draft resolution which it adopted without a vote, and in paragraph 29 it recommends to the Assembly the adoption of three draft decisions, which it also adopted without a vote.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): If there is no proposal under rule 66 of the rules of procedure, I shall take it that the General Assembly decides not to discuss the reports of the Second Committee which are before the Assembly today.

It was so decided.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Statements will therefore be limited to explanations of vote.

(The President)

The positions of delegations regarding the various recommendations of the Second Committee have been made clear in the Committee and are reflected in the relevant official records.

May I remind members that under paragraph 7 of decision 34/401 the General Assembly agreed that

"When the same draft resolution is considered in a Main Committee and in plenary meeting, a delegation should, as far as possible, explain its vote only once, that is, either in the Committee or in plenary meeting unless that delegation's vote in plenary meeting is different from its vote in the Committee."

May I remind delegations that, also in accordance with General Assembly decision 34/401, explanations of vote are limited to 10 minutes and should be made by delegations from their seats.

Before we begin to take action on the recommendations contained in the reports of the Second Committee, I should like to advise members that, unless delegations have already notified the Secretariat that they wish to do otherwise, we shall take decisions in the same manner as was done in the Second Committee. This means that where separate votes or recorded votes were taken we shall do the same thing.

I would express the hope that we shall be able to proceed to adopt without a vote those recommendations that were adopted without a vote in the Second Committee.

I now invite members to turn their attention to parts I and III of the report of the Second Committee (A/46/727 and A/46/727/Add.2) on agenda item 12, "Report of the Economic and Social Council".

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I call on the representative of the Netherlands.

Mr. MAJOOR (Netherlands): With regard to draft resolution IV, I should like to indicate before it is adopted by consensus, as recommended, that a technical change must be made in paragraph 4. In its third and fourth lines the phrase should read: "not reduce or divert official development assistance, including food aid". The words "the resources and" should be deleted; they do not appear in the text we agreed on in the Second Committee.

The PRESIDENT: That technical change will be made.

(spoke in Arabic)

Draft resolution IV is entitled "Impact of the recent evolution of East-West relations on the growth of the world economy, in particular on the economic growth and development of the developing countries, as well as on international economic co-operation".

The Second Committee adopted this draft resolution without a vote. May I consider that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution IV was adopted (resolution 46/202).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution V is entitled "Prevention and control of acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS)".

The draft resolution was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I consider that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution V was adopted (resolution 46/203).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly will now turn to the three draft decisions recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 42 of part I of its report (A/46/727).

Draft decision I is entitled "Phase II of the Transport and Communications Decade for Asia and the Pacific, 1985-1994".

(The President)

The Second Committee adopted draft decision I without a vote. May I consider that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision I was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision II is entitled "Documents relating to the report of the Economic and Social Council".

The Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the draft decision. May I consider that the Assembly wishes to do so?

Draft decision II was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision III, entitled "Biennial programme of work for the Second Committee for 1992-1993", is also recommended for adoption by the Second Committee. May I consider that the Assembly wishes to do so?

Draft decision III was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I now invite representatives to turn to part III of the report of the Second Committee (A/46/727/Add.2).

The Assembly will first take a decision on the three draft resolutions recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 33 of that report.

Draft resolution I is entitled "Special assistance to Namibia".

The Second Committee adopted the draft resolution without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution I was adopted (resolution 46/204).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution II is entitled "Convening of an international conference on the financing of development".

(The President)

Draft resolution II was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution II was adopted (resolution 46/205).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution III is entitled "Report of the Committee for Development Planning: criteria for identifying the least developed countries". The report of the Fifth Committee on the programme-budget implications of the draft resolution is contained in document A/46/801.

In connection with this draft resolution, I should like to draw the attention of the Assembly to a letter (A/46/787) from the representative of Madagascar addressed to the Secretary-General informing him that the Malagasy Government endorses the recommendation of the Committee for Development Planning on the inclusion of Madagascar in the group of least developed countries, that the letter should be taken as an expression of Madagascar's due consent as set forth in draft resolution III and that, accordingly, the Malagasy delegation wishes to have Madagascar added to the list of countries contained in paragraph 6 of draft resolution III.

May I take it that the Assembly wishes to add Madagascar to the list of countries contained in paragraph 6 of draft resolution III?

It was so decided.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution III was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same, bearing in mind the decision just taken?

Draft resolution III was adopted (resolution 46/206).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly will now turn to the three draft decisions recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 34 of part III of its report (A/46/727/Add.2).

Draft decision I is entitled "Second Transport and Communications Decade in Africa".

The Second Committee adopted this draft decision without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision I was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision II is entitled "Europe-Africa permanent link through the Strait of Gibraltar".

This draft decision was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision II was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision III is entitled "Second Industrial Development Decade for Africa (1991-2000)".

The Second Committee adopted this draft decision without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision III was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I shall now call on those representatives who wish to explain their votes or positions on the resolutions just adopted.

Mr. SEZAKI (Japan): My delegation would like to refer to draft resolution III in the report of the Second Committee in document A/46/727/Add.2, on the report of the Economic and Social Council. This draft resolution is entitled "Report of the Committee for Development Planning: criteria for identifying the least developed countries", and the Assembly has just adopted it by consensus.

(Mr. Suzuki, Japan)

While my delegation decided to support the draft resolution in the spirit of consensus, after careful consideration of the debate in the Second Committee, I should like briefly to comment on the aid policy of the Government of Japan with respect to the adoption of new criteria for identifying least developed countries.

(Mr. Sezaki, Japan)

Japan has consistently extended development assistance to those countries on the United Nations list of least developed countries, and that has included debt-relief grants provided in accordance with the resolution S/IX/165 of the Trade and Development Board. I wish to state that, without prejudice to the aid policy to least developed countries it has followed so far, the Government of Japan will have to study whether it will be able to provide the debt-relief grant assistance to which I have just referred to the countries which this resolution adds to the list of least developed countries.

I should like to take this occasion to reaffirm my Government's commitment to continue to support the efforts of the least developed countries to solve the problems confronting them, as well as the great importance it continues to attach to implementation of the programme of action for the least developed countries for the 1990s.

Mr. SZEDLACSKO (Hungary): I have the honour to speak on behalf of the Czech and Slovak Federal Republic, Poland and my own country, Hungary.

It gives me great pleasure to stress that delegations, after long and - let us admit, painful - negotiations, joined in the consensus on the draft resolution - submitted under agenda item 12 - which is entitled "Impact of the recent evolution of East-West relations on the growth of the world economy, in particular on the economic growth and development of developing countries, as well as on international economic cooperation", and which is contained in document A/46/727.

We should like to thank the Chairman of the Group of 77, whose diplomatic skill and understanding of the interests of all negotiating parties helped us to reach an agreement on the text of the draft resolution presented by his Group as a follow-up to the high-level meeting held at Geneva in July 1991.

(Mr. Szedlacsko, Hungary)

The revolutionary changes that have occurred in the countries of Central and Eastern Europe overturned the old order, terminating the decades-long cold war. One should not underestimate the positive aspects of those changes in their political as well as their economic dimensions. We are deeply convinced that this recent evolution in East-West relations will be beneficial to all countries, including those which were particularly closely linked to the countries of the former Eastern bloc.

In the last paragraph of the resolution just adopted, the General Assembly requests the Secretary-General to prepare a comprehensive report on, inter alia, the implementation of the resolution. Realizing the difficulties in collecting statistical data as well as the analytical problems, we know that we are imposing on the Secretariat an extremely difficult task. Let us assure the Assembly that the Secretariat can rely on our assistance and understanding in the preparation of this report.

Mr. KUFUOR (Ghana): I wish to make a statement on the adoption of draft resolution IV in document A/46/727, particularly in the light of the statement made by the representative of Czechoslovakia.

Draft resolution IV was one of the difficult texts negotiated in the Second Committee. During those negotiations the opinions of all delegations were taken into account.

In the course of the discussion on the draft resolution, particularly in relation to paragraph 7 to which the representative of Hungary adverted, the Secretariat did not give any indication that the request that was being made by the General Assembly to the Secretary-General was too difficult to implement. No statement to that effect was made. Indeed, the concern expressed by the representative of Hungary was not raised in the Second

Committee. We hope that the Secretariat will provide the information requested in paragraph 7 of draft resolution IV, which the Assembly has adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The assembly has concluded its consideration of the chapters of the report of the Economic and Social Council allocated to the Second Committee, and of agenda item 12.

We now turn to part III of the report of the Second Committee (A/46/645/Add.2), on agenda item 77 (a), "Development and international economic cooperation: trade and development".

The Assembly will take a decision on the eight draft resolutions recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 40 of its report and on the draft decision recommended by the Committee in paragraph 41 of that report.

The Assembly will turn first to the eight draft resolutions contained in paragraph 40 of the report of the Second Committee.

Draft resolution I is entitled "Strengthening international organizations in the area of multilateral trade".

This draft resolution was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution I was adopted (resolution 46/207).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution II, entitled "Environment and international trade," was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution II was adopted (resolution 46/208).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The representative of Cuba has asked to make a statement on a point of order, and I now call upon him.

Mr. FERNANDEZ de COBBIO DOMINGUEZ (Cuba) (interpretation from Spanish): Despite an error in the pagination of the Spanish version of the report in document A/46/645/Add.2 -- to which we have drawn the Secretariat's attention -- my delegation will not oppose the adoption of the recommendations in the report since the error does not exist in the English version, the original text.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Due note is taken of the statement of the representative of Cuba, and the error will be corrected in the final documentation.

Draft resolution III, "Trade and Development Board," was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution III was adopted (resolution 46/209).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution IV is entitled "Economic measures as a means of political and economic coercion against developing countries".

A recorded vote has been requested.

A recorded vote was taken.

The Second Committee adopted draft resolution V without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution V was adopted (resolution 46/211).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution VI is entitled "Specific actions related to the particular needs and problems of land-locked developing countries".

This draft resolution was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes also to adopt the draft resolution?

Draft resolution VI was adopted (resolution 46/212).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution VII is entitled "United Nations/International Maritime Organization Conference of Plenipotentiaries on a Draft Convention on Maritime Liens and Mortgages". The report of the Fifth Committee on the programme-budget implications of this draft resolution is contained in document A/46/786.

This draft resolution was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes likewise to adopt the draft resolution?

Draft resolution VII was adopted (resolution 46/213).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft resolution VIII is entitled "International code of conduct on the transfer of technology".

This draft resolution was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft resolution VIII was adopted (resolution 46/214).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We turn now to the draft decision recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 41 of its report (A/46/645/Add.2). The draft decision is entitled "Note by the Secretary-General on progress in the implementation of specific action related to the particular needs and problems of the land-locked developing countries".

The Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the draft decision. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to adopt it?

The draft decision was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I shall now call on representatives wishing to speak in explanation of vote or position.

Mr. SERSALE di CERISANO (Argentina) (interpretation from Spanish): With respect to draft resolution IV, "Economic measures as a means of political and economic coercion against developing countries", my delegation's vote is a mark of Argentina's concern about the lack of dialogue between the parties at the time the text was being drafted. We are ready to help avoid such situations in the future and to ensure that the United Nations and the Economic and Social Council focus on the development of developing countries.

Mr. GUERRERO (Philippines): The Philippines abstained in the Second Committee's vote on draft resolution IV, "Economic measures as a means of political and economic coercion against developing countries". The Philippines has revised its position, and this evening cast a vote in favour of the draft resolution. This is in line with the full solidarity of the Philippines with the position of the Group of 77.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We have concluded our consideration of agenda item 77 (a).

We turn now to part VII of the report of the Second Committee (A/46/645/Add.6), on agenda item 77 (a), entitled "Development and international economic cooperation: environment".

I call on the representative of Oman.

MR. AL-SAMWEN (Oman) (interpretation from Arabic): While my delegation supports draft resolution I in document A/46/645/Add.6), entitled "Large-scale pelagic driftnet fishing and its impact on the living marine resources of the world's oceans and seas", I wish to convey the wish of the Sultanate of Oman that its name be deleted from the list of sponsors of this draft resolution, as we had indicated earlier to the secretariat of the Second Committee.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Note has been taken of the statement by the representative of Oman.

The Second Committee adopted without a vote draft decision 1, entitled "Environment and agricultural policies". May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision I was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision III is entitled "Report of the Governing Council of the United Nations Environment Programme".

This draft decision was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision III was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Second Committee recommends for adoption draft decision IV, entitled "Documents relating to environment". May I take it that the Assembly wishes to adopt this draft decision?

Draft decision IV was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I now call on the representative of Turkey, who wishes to speak in explanation of his delegation's position.

Mr. TANLAY (Turkey) (interpretation from French): My delegation expressed its support by participating in the consensus on the draft resolution entitled "Large-scale pelagic drift-net fishing and its impact on the living marine resources of the world's oceans and seas", which refers to the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea in its third preambular paragraph. However, my delegation's participation in the consensus on the

draft resolution does not in any way change its position on the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

That position has been explained repeatedly, and therefore at this time I shall simply refer to the most recent statement on the matter, made by my delegation to the General Assembly on 12 December 1991. That statement appears in the verbatim record of the 71st plenary meeting of the forty-sixth session of the Assembly.

This explanation of position applies also to draft resolution VI, entitled "Specific actions related to the particular needs and problems of land-locked developing countries", which was adopted today in the context of the Second Committee's report in document A/46/645/Add.2. This draft resolution, in its sixth preambular paragraph, also refers to the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We have concluded our consideration of agenda item 77 (e) and of agenda item 77 as a whole.

(The President)

The Assembly will now consider agenda item 82, entitled "Operational activities for development". In this connection the Assembly has before it the report of the Second Committee (A/46/732), containing a draft resolution recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 28 and three draft decisions recommended by the Committee in paragraph 29. The Assembly also has before it a draft resolution contained in document A/46/L.54.

We shall first take decisions on the recommendations contained in the report of the Third Committee and shall then proceed to consider draft resolution A/46/L.54.

The Assembly will now take up the report of the Second Committee (A/46/732) and will take decisions on the recommendations contained in paragraphs 28 and 29 of that report.

I call on the representative of Poland, who wishes to make a statement in explanation of his delegation's position.

Mr. RYSINSKI (Poland): Poland has joined in supporting the draft resolution contained in document A/46/L.54, having reached an understanding with the coordinators of the Group of 77 on the basis of negotiations. Our understanding provides, first, for the withdrawal of Poland's amendments to the draft resolution relating to the needs and concerns of recipient countries and/or countries in transition and, secondly, for the consideration of this issue in the context of the triennial review at the forty-seventh session of the General Assembly with a view to having the needs and concerns of these countries taken into account in the relevant resolution of the General Assembly at that session.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly will first turn to the draft resolution entitled "United Nations Development Programme

Human Development Report", recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 28 of its report (A/46/732).

The draft resolution was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

The draft resolution was adopted (resolution 46/218).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly will now take decisions on the three draft decisions recommended by the Second Committee in paragraph 29 of its report.

Draft decision I is entitled "Technical cooperation among developing countries as a modality in the formulation, preparation, execution and evaluation of the projects implemented by the organs, organizations, bodies, programmes and specialized agencies of the United Nations system in the economic, social and related fields".

The Second Committee adopted this draft decision without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly wishes to do the same?

Draft decision I was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision II, entitled "Strengthening of the work of the United Nations in the field of operational activities", was adopted by the Second Committee without a vote. May I take it that the General Assembly also wishes to do so?

Draft decision II was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): Draft decision III, entitled "Documents relating to operational activities for development", is recommended by the Second Committee for adoption. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to adopt the draft decision?

Draft decision III was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly will now consider the draft resolution contained in document A/46/L.54, entitled "Operational activities of the United Nations system".

I call on the representative of Ireland to introduce the draft resolution.

Mr. BURKE (Ireland): I have the honour to introduce, on behalf of my delegation, the draft resolution contained in document A/46/L.54. This draft resolution, which is entitled "Operational activities of the United Nations system", covers a matter that is of great importance to Member States. But for technical considerations, it would have been adopted by consensus in the Second Committee. This state of affairs is reflected in paragraph 12 of document A/46/732.

I therefore commend the draft resolution to the General Assembly for adoption without a vote.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The General Assembly will now take a decision on the draft resolution contained in document A/46/L.54. The report of the Fifth Committee on the programme-budget implications of the draft resolution is contained in document A/46/796.

May I take it that the Assembly decides to adopt the draft resolution?

Draft resolution A/46/L.54 was adopted (resolution 46/219).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I call on the representative of Japan for an explanation of position.

Mr. SEZAKI (Japan): My delegation is very pleased that the draft resolution on the Human Development Report of the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) was adopted without a vote. However, I should like to state the view of my Government on the question of the human-freedom index contained in the Human Development Report, 1991, of UNDP.

(Mr. Sasaki, Japan)

In making decisions concerning the provision of official development assistance to a developing country, the Government of Japan takes various factors into account - one of these is the state of democracy and human rights - in the belief that it is important that all nations strive for progress in this area. Since the publication of the Human Development Report, 1991, the Japanese delegation has consistently expressed grave doubts as to the appropriateness of the incorporation of a human-freedom index. There are two reasons for this doubt.

First, the incorporation of such an index raises serious questions about the mandate and competence of UNDP. Japan has no objection to the serious study of issues related to human rights by an appropriate organ of the United Nations system, such as the United Nations Centre for Human Rights. Also, Japan is of the view that the relationship between human rights and human development should be studied further in a coordinated manner by the relevant bodies of the United Nations, including the Centre for Human Rights, the Department of International Economic and Social Affairs (DIESA) and UNDP, within their respective mandates.

Secondly, because it does not have a solid basis, the index has needlessly caused serious division between Member States. It is the earnest hope of the Japanese delegation that at its special session in February 1992 the Governing Council of UNDP will have an opportunity to discuss the problem thoroughly with a view to achieving a resolution of the division of opinion between the developed countries and the developing countries.

The PRESIDENT: I thank the representative of Japan for the important points he has raised, which are worthy of very serious consideration.

The Assembly will take a decision on the draft resolution entitled "Rationalization of the work of the Fifth Committee: biennialization of the programme of work", recommended by the Fifth Committee in paragraph 8 of the report. For the moment, the draft resolution is contained in document A/C.5/46/L.16.

The Fifth Committee adopted the draft resolution without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

The draft resolution was adopted (resolution 46/220).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): The Assembly will now turn to the draft decision contained in paragraph 9 of the report.

May I take it that the Assembly wishes to adopt this draft decision?

The draft decision was adopted.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We have concluded our consideration of agenda item 105.

The Assembly will now turn to the report of the Fifth Committee (A/46/818) on agenda item 114, entitled "Scale of assessments for the apportionment of the expenses of the United Nations".

The Assembly will take a decision on draft resolution A to D, recommended by the Fifth Committee in paragraph 7 of its report. This draft resolution is, for the moment, contained in document A/C.5/46/L.20.

The Fifth Committee adopted this draft resolution without a vote. May I take it that the Assembly wishes to do the same?

The draft resolution was adopted (resolution 46/221 A to D).

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I now call on the representative of the Islamic Republic of Iran, who wishes to speak in explanation of his delegation's position.

Mr. BARIMANI (Islamic Republic of Iran): As has been reiterated on several occasions by my delegation during consideration of agenda item 114, the Islamic Republic of Iran has serious reservations concerning the proposed scale of assessments. However, my delegation gave its indulgence to the adoption of the proposed scale by consensus, on the understanding that the Committee on Contributions will re-examine the case of my country in accordance with paragraph 1 of the resolution which has just been adopted. Of course, in doing so, the Committee should also rely on information acquired from the International Monetary Fund.

At the same time, the Islamic Republic of Iran wishes to maintain its reservations concerning paragraphs 2 (a), 3 (f) and 4 of this resolution.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): We have concluded our consideration of agenda item 114.

It was so decided.

The PRESIDENT (interpretation from Arabic): I now call on the representative of Denmark, who wishes to make a statement.

Mr. ANDERSON (Denmark): On behalf of the five Nordic countries - Finland, Iceland, Norway, Sweden and Denmark I should like to explain our position with regard to agenda items 109 and 110.

The Nordic countries deeply regret the lack of political will to reach an agreement at this session on any of the proposals by the Secretary-General concerning the financial crisis of the Organization. We are particularly concerned over the lack of action on the proposal to establish a peace-keeping reserve fund. In a situation where several new peace-keeping operations are either being launched or under active consideration, the need to lay a secure and equitable basis for funding the start-up phase of such operations is obvious.

The Nordic countries strongly feel that the General Assembly should have been able to act at this session on the only positive recommendation that the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions made with respect to the Secretary-General's proposals. Moreover, we are convinced that the establishment of a peace-keeping reserve fund enjoys broad support within the membership of the United Nations at large.

This session is about to be suspended. The Nordic countries consider it imperative that during the forty-sixth session, when it resumes, the General Assembly concur in the recommendation of the Advisory Committee, as contained in paragraph 12 of its report, that a fund be established for the financing of the start-up costs of peace-keeping operations. We look forward to addressing this issue, including its technical details.

## STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

The PRESIDENT: It has been customary for the President of the General Assembly to make a concluding review of the deliberations of the session at this point of our work. However, since we intend to continue working actively over the coming months of the session, I shall make my overall assessment of the results of the session when it concludes in September. For now, I should like to make only a few remarks.

In presiding over this session of the General Assembly so far, I have benefited from the endeavours of each of you. The successful results achieved in the various Committees have proved that our energies have been channelled effectively, constructively and productively. Here, I should like to express my appreciation for the constructive attitude adopted by delegations during the course of the General Assembly's session, and I hope that this positive atmosphere of cooperation will continue and will grow even stronger during the remaining part of the session, over the next nine months.

I must at this point convey my sincere appreciation to all representatives for heeding my appeal with regard to the necessity of conforming to schedules and work programmes. In some meetings the requirement of a quorum was dispensed with and we succeeded in underscoring the importance of the timetable.

In terms of the number of resolutions we were able to achieve, mergers were possible, consensus was desirable and reductions were practicable. Our main thrusts were on the rationalization of work and the displacement of quantity by quality. I feel that on both counts your success was commendable. These were no mean achievements, as you know.

Some of the landmark accomplishments of the session so far include the institutionalization of the office of the President of the General Assembly, the strengthening of the coordination of United Nations humanitarian and emergency assistance, the efforts proceeding successfully towards the restructuring and revitalization of the United Nations in the economic, social and related fields, the smooth and efficient manner with which the budget was adopted by consensus, and the continuing consultations in the President's Ad Hoc Group on the restructuring of the United Nations Secretariat. The ongoing achievements of the President's Ad Hoc Working Groups in major fields of interest to the membership have been a source of real satisfaction to me, and to you I am sure. Some of the Ad Hoc Groups are still working, and others pertaining to major fields of interest will be established during the course of the year.

May I take this opportunity to express my sincerest appreciation again, and even more strongly, to the Secretary-General, Mr. Javier Perez de Cuellar, whose close cooperation I have had the pleasure and privilege of enjoying all through this part of the session and whose dedicated services over the past 10 years in promoting the principles and purposes of the Organization we sincerely acknowledge and shall always remember.

I also thank the Vics-Presidents of the Assembly and the Chairmen, Vice-Chairmen and Rapporteurs of the Main Committees for their excellent work and their good spirit of cooperation.

I wish also to thank the Under-Secretary-General for Political and General Assembly Affairs, Ambassador Ronald Spiers, and the entire staff of his Department, for the great help I have received from them, and to give special thanks to the Division of General Assembly Affairs. My thanks also go

to the Department of Conference Services, to the interpreters, translators, conference and documents officers, typists and press officers, and to the efficient security services.

In concluding, I should like to express warmest thanks to the Heads of State and Government, foreign ministers and delegations of Member States for the kind words addressed to me and to my country, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

Much has been achieved over the first three months of the session, but much remains to be done during the remainder of the session. I look forward to working actively and in close cooperation with you in making the rest of the session a noteworthy success. The constructive deliberations of the General Assembly over the past three months, at a time when the world has been witnessing the heralding of a new and more positive era in international relations, has confirmed the great, effective role of the United Nations and the centrality of the General Assembly, especially in the context of the present evolving new world arrangements. I hope our work over the coming months of the session will continue to make a significant contribution to this process.

Before I suspend the session, allow me to wish you all happy holidays and to extend season's greetings.

The PRESIDENT: I declare the forty-sixth session of the General Assembly suspended.
