Overall orientation

- 20.1 The programme is under the responsibility of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (ECE).
- 20.2 The programme aims to promote regional cooperation and integration as a means of achieving sustainable development in the ECE region. To ensure an integrated approach to sustainable development and the effective implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, the programme will enhance existing synergies and linkages between its eight subprogrammes: (a) environment; (b) transport; (c) statistics; (d) economic cooperation and integration; (e) sustainable energy; (f) trade; (g) forestry and timber; and (h) housing, land management and population. Furthermore, it will align all subprogrammes with their specific Sustainable Development Goals and related targets, with due consideration to climate change mitigation and adaptation measures.
- 20.3 Consistent with the legislative mandates, including Commission decision A (65) of 11 April 2013 on the outcome of the review of the 2005 reform of ECE, the programme will promote regional cooperation and integration through: (a) policy dialogue; (b) normative work; and (c) technical cooperation.
- 20.4 Due consideration will be given to the gender dimension of development, given that women constitute more than half of the world's population and are active agents and beneficiaries of sustainable development in the region. Gender equality and the empowerment of women will be integrated into the ECE programme of work in accordance with the United Nations System-wide

Action Plan and Sustainable Development Goal 5. In particular, the programme will focus on women in the economy and promote women's entrepreneurship in the region.

- 20.5 ECE will also pursue system-wide coherence in its programme delivery to avoid overlap, reduce duplication, multiply effect, increase impact and ensure the sustainability of its work in the region. To that end, it will draw upon the work of other United Nations entities and relevant regional organizations. It will provide leadership to the Regional Coordination Mechanism and contribute to the work of the United Nations Development Group for Europe and Central Asia by supporting the United Nations Development Assistance Framework and One United Nations programmes in the region.
- 20.6 The United Nations Special Programme for the Economies of Central Asia, jointly implemented by ECE and the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, will continue to serve as the major framework for ECE cooperation with other relevant stakeholders in Central Asia.
- 20.7 Within its mandate, the programme will contribute to the follow-up and review of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, including within the framework of the high-level political forum on sustainable development under the auspices of the Economic and Social Council and the General Assembly.
- 20.8 The ECE Executive Committee approved the strategic framework for programme 17, Economic development in Europe, for the period 2018-2019 at its 81st meeting on 23 November 2015, without prejudice to the outcome of the review of the legislative mandates by the Committee for Programme and Coordination.

Overview of resources

- 20.9 The overall resources proposed for the biennium 2018-2019 for this section amount to \$64,839,700 before recosting, reflecting a net decrease of \$1,098,800 (or 1.7 per cent) compared with the appropriation for 2016-2017. Resource changes result from two factors, namely: (a) technical adjustments relating to the phased abolishment of posts (\$83,800); and (b) other resource changes (\$1,015,000). The proposed resource level provides for the full, efficient and effective implementation of mandates.
- 20.10 The distribution of resources is reflected in tables 20.3 to 20.5 below.

Technical adjustments

20.11 Resource changes reflect reductions of \$83,800 relating to the phased abolishment of posts approved by the General Assembly in its resolution 70/247.

Other changes

20.12 Resource changes reflect a reduction of \$1,015,000, made possible from efficiencies that ECE plans to bring about in the biennium 2018-2019. The proposed reductions result partly from anticipated Umoja efficiencies presented in the eighth progress report of the Secretary-General on the enterprise resource planning project (A/71/390) to individual day-to-day operations. The Umoja efficiencies set out in the eighth progress report were based on the Organization's experience with the system, anticipated future changes, including future roll-outs, a global review of end-to-end processes, the retirement of legacy systems and improvements to business process

and planning capabilities. Efficiencies were expressed, inter alia, as the dollar value of a full-time equivalent, where applicable. Further information on the approach is provided in the foreword and introduction of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2018-2019. Other efficiencies resulting from a redistribution of work within executive direction and management as a result of the abolition of the D-1 Principal Economic Affairs Officer are further specified in paragraph 20.30 below.

20.13 For the Economic Commission for Europe, this translates to post and non-post reductions of \$1,015,000, which fall under executive direction and management (\$375,900), all eight subprogrammes under the programme of work (\$377,100) and under programme support (\$262,000).

Extrabudgetary resources

- 20.14 ECE receives both cash and in-kind contributions, which complement regular budget resources and continue to be vital in the delivery of its mandates.
- 20.15 Voluntary cash contributions for 2018-2019, estimated at \$34,522,800, reflect a decrease of \$1,177,800 over the 2016-2017 biennium. The estimated amount is comprised of \$9,878,600 for posts (5 P-4, 16 P-3, 2 P-2 and 7 GS (OL)) and \$24,644,200 for non-post resources, which would support various substantive and technical cooperation activities, including training, workshops, seminars and field projects. The projected reduction in resources is mainly due to the anticipated reduction in the number of projected activities to be undertaken in 2018-2019, resulting from a number of projects completed in 2016-2017.
- 20.16 Anticipated in-kind contributions would provide for technical expert services (with an estimated value of \$74,500) to support the operation of the new central office for the Sustainable Transport Division's Trans-European Railway project; the new office will be located in Belgrade.

Other information

- 20.17 ECE has taken further efforts to strengthen accountability by: (a) implementing, in a timely fashion, the recommendations from the programme evaluation of ECE and the audit of selected ECE subprogrammes and related technical cooperation projects completed by the Office of Internal Oversight Services (OIOS) in 2016. These included, inter alia, the adoption of the new resource mobilization strategy and the knowledge management strategy, as well as the revised directive on establishment of agreements and management of extrabudgetary resources; (b) promoting a culture of self-evaluation, in line with the ECE evaluation policy (see para. 20.20 below); (c) assessing the ECE risks and adopting a biennial risk treatment plan; and (d) ensuring that the Executive Committee receives regular reports on all extrabudgetary funding.
- 20.18 Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 58/269, resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation for this section would amount to \$1,463,600, of which \$1,458,600 (90 work-months) represents 79 work-months for staff in the Professional category and 11 work-months for staff in the General Service category funded by the regular budget, and \$5,000 represents consultancy requirements funded by extrabudgetary resources.
- 20.19 In line with the ECE biennial evaluation workplan for 2016-2017, three evaluations were conducted by independent consultants, one at the programme level and two at the subprogramme level. In addition, ECE evaluated 12 projects in 2016-2017. For each evaluation ECE issued a management response and a progress report, tracking the implementation of each recommendation. In December 2016, ECE organized a round table with international organizations and delegations from the permanent missions on evaluation and organizational learning in order to identify tips for strengthening the independence and utility of evaluations in the United Nations system.
- 20.20 The ECE evaluation workplan for the biennium 2018-2019 was approved by the Executive Committee in September 2016. The Executive Committee requested the Secretariat to increase and strengthen the evaluation function in ECE. In line with the request, a P-4 post has been proposed

under Executive Direction and management to perform programme evaluation and audit. In the biennium 2018-19, ECE plans to undertake one evaluation at the programme level, to review the effectiveness and impact of gender mainstreaming in all eight ECE subprogrammes, and three evaluations at the subprogramme level, as follows: (a) evaluation of the environment subprogramme to assess the relevance, effectiveness, efficiency and impact of the environmental performance reviews of ECE; (b) evaluation of the trade subprogramme to assess the relevance of the studies on regulatory and procedural barriers to trade in Kyrgyzstan; and (c) evaluation of the transport subprogramme to assess the effectiveness of its support to Governments on climate change mitigation. In line with its evaluation policy, ECE will also evaluate all projects costing \$250,000 or more. This includes the evaluation of six projects in the environment subprogramme; two in the trade subprogramme; two in the statistics subprogramme; and two in the housing, land management and population subprogramme. In addition, the Executive Committee requested the preparation of an annual analytical assessment of the lessons learned from all evaluations, and the subsequent changes to the programme of work from evaluative effort to be discussed by the Executive Committee on an annual basis (see ECE/EXCOM/CONCLU/91, available at: https://www.unece.org/info/aboutunece/executive-committee-excom/meetings.html). All evaluation reports, their management response and progress reports are made available on the public ECE website.

- 20.21 Central support services, financial services, human resources services, information and communication services are provided to ECE by the United Nations Office at Geneva and the related resources are reflected under section 29F, Administration, Geneva, while administration, conference and general services provided to ECE by the United Nations Office at Geneva and the related resources are reflected under section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management.
- 20.22 The Commission cooperates closely with other United Nations partners to reduce duplication, increase impact and ensure sustainability of its operational work at the country level. It contributes to the work of the United Nations Development Group for Europe and Central Asia by supporting the United Nations Development Assistance Framework process and "One United Nations" programmes in the 17 countries of the ECE region. The Commission also cooperates and coordinates with other United Nations regional commissions through joint projects and programmes, information-sharing and knowledge management, and through regular meetings of the Executive Secretaries and Chiefs of Programme Planning.
- 20.23 In order to permit a comparison among regional commissions, while at the same time maintaining the advantages of integrated management and avoiding duplication of effort, the estimated resources to be provided by the United Nations Office at Geneva to ECE for general, administrative, conference and library services during the biennium 2018-2019 are summarized in table 20.6.

A. Policymaking organs

20.25 The governance structure of ECE has been revised in accordance with the workplan on ECE reform adopted by the General Assembly in its resolution 60/248, and the outcome of the review of the 2005 reform of the ECE adopted by the Economic and Social Council in its resolution 2013/1. The Commission reports to the Council and provides strategic direction to the work of the ECE secretariat. It serves as a regional platform for high-level policy dialogue on sustainable development in the region. It meets once every two years for up to three working days. In the intersessional period, the Executive Committee is entrusted with the implementation of the overall policy set by the Commission. It meets as often as necessary to perform its governance role with regard to programme planning, administrative and budgetary issues, including extrabudgetary funding. It reviews and approves the programmes of work and subsidiary structures of the sectoral committees, thus ensuring coherence and coordination among subprogrammes. The following eight sectoral committees act as subsidiary bodies of the Commission and as governing bodies for the eight subprogrammes: the Committee on Environmental Policy (subprogramme 1); the Inland Transport Committee (subprogramme 2); the Conference of European Statisticians (subprogramme 3); the Committee on Innovation, Competitiveness and Public-Private Partnerships (subprogramme 4); the Committee on Sustainable Energy (subprogramme 5); the Steering Committee on Trade Capacity and Standards (subprogramme 6); the Committee on Forests and the Forest Industry (subprogramme 7); and the Committee on Housing and Land Management (subprogramme 8). These bodies meet for two to three days annually to provide guidance to ECE on work relating to their respective sectors.

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$8,603,600

- 20.26 The overall responsibilities of the executive direction and management component include the following functions:
 - (a) To promote policy dialogue among member States on the strategic direction of ECE and its responses to the new development challenges and priorities of member States;
 - (b) To foster relationships with member Governments and keep abreast of the needs of ECE member States;
 - (c) To provide guidance and direction for the work of the Secretariat, coordinate the planning and implementation of the ECE programme of work and promote interdivisional cooperation, particularly on cross-cutting issues;
 - (d) To provide substantive services to the sessions of the Commission and the meetings of its Executive Committee, including the preparation of relevant parliamentary documentation, and to ensure the follow-up to and implementation of their decisions;
 - (e) To serve as an interface between the Executive Committee and the bureaux of the sectoral committees;

- (f) To promote transparency and accountability, inclusiveness and participation in the work of the Secretariat;
- (g) To promote organizational learning through evaluation of the work of the programme, subprogrammes and projects, and the improvement of programme performance through the effective application of evaluation findings;
- (h) To undertake regional policy reviews on major cross-sectoral issues related to sustainable development, in particular on the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals, and gender;
- To ensure the implementation of the resolutions and decisions of the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council that are relevant to the work of ECE, including those on the follow-up to and implementation of the major outcomes of the United Nations summits and conferences;
- (j) To ensure oversight and provide quality assurance of ECE publications and key parliamentary documents prepared for the sectoral committees and other subsidiary bodies of ECE;
- (k) To increase the visibility of and raise awareness about the ECE work through the wide dissemination of information and through outreach activities;
- (1) To promote cooperation with other regional commissions, regional organizations and regional financial institutions;
- (m) To strengthen the United Nations system-wide coherence at the country level through participation in the United Nations Development Assistance Framework and "One United Nations" programmes;
- (n) To cooperate and coordinate with other United Nations entities active in the ECE region, in particular within the framework of the Regional Coordination Mechanism and Regional United Nations Development Group, and through the United Nations Resident Coordinator system at the country level;
- (o) To contribute inputs to relevant reports of the Secretary-General for the General Assembly, the Economic and Social Council and other main and subsidiary bodies of the United Nations;
- (p) To promote the advancement of women and gender equality in the ECE secretariat and ensure gender mainstreaming in the programme of work of the Commission;
- (q) To coordinate the preparation of the ECE biennial programme budget and ensure effective monitoring and reporting on its implementation.
- 20.27 ECE executive direction and management component comprises the Office of the Executive Secretary, the Programme Management Unit, the Sustainable Development and Gender Unit, and the Information Unit.
- 20.28 The Office of the Executive Secretary, which includes the Executive Secretary, the Deputy Executive Secretary and the Secretary of the Commission, has the overall responsibility for providing policy guidance and leadership in the ECE secretariat, including the coordination of the work of the Commission; overseeing and developing relations with Governments; coordination with the United Nations Secretariat; reporting to the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council; and overseeing and developing relations with other United Nations entities and with non-United Nations organizations, civil society and non-governmental organizations.
- 20.29 The core functions of the Programme Management Unit are to provide guidance and ensure overall coordination of all aspects (planning, monitoring, reporting and evaluation) of programme management. The Unit provides guidance and ensures overall coordination of technical cooperation, and promotes synergies between the normative and operational work of the organization. It serves as a secretariat of the Working Group on Technical Cooperation and supports resource mobilization for technical cooperation activities. The Unit coordinates with other regional commissions and United Nations entities on programmatic and technical cooperation issues.

- 20.30 With the abolition of the D-1 post, its two core functions, namely oversight and enterprise risk management, will be redistributed within the Office of the Executive Secretary in recognition of the importance of these controls as regularly noted in recent OIOS audits and programme evaluations. At the same time, the integrity of operational checks and quality assurance functions of the Programme Management Unit will remain unaffected, under the management of a P-5 Chief reporting and accountable directly to the Executive Secretary, in accordance with the Secretary-General's bulletin (ST/SGB/2008/9).
- 20.31 The proposed establishment of a new P-4 Programme Officer (Evaluation) to centralize the evaluation function at ECE is consistent with General Assembly resolution 67/226, in which the Assembly emphasized the importance "of having independent, credible and useful evaluation functions, with sufficient resources, and promoting a culture of evaluation that ensures the active use of evaluation findings and recommendations in policy development and improving the functioning of the organizations" (para. 173). The establishment of the new post is also consistent with a request of ECE member States and recent OIOS audit and evaluation recommendations. The P-4 Programme Officer (Evaluation) will report to the Executive Secretary, through the Chief of the Programme Management Unit.
- 20.32 The Sustainable Development and Gender Unit provides a regional perspective on major crosssectoral themes, including sustainable development and gender, the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its Sustainable Development Goals through the organization of regional meetings, the preparation and coordination of policy-oriented inputs in preparation for and follow-up to United Nations major conferences and summits in the economic, social, environmental and related fields, as well as to the relevant reports of the Secretary-General to the Economic and Social Council and the General Assembly. The Unit also provides secretariat services to the meetings of the Regional Coordination Mechanism, comprising the directors of the regional offices for Europe and Central Asia of the United Nations funds, programmes and specialized agencies, and contributes to inter-agency reports and other outputs of the Mechanism.
- 20.33 The Information Unit is in charge of implementing the ECE information strategy aimed at raising awareness and mobilizing support to the work of ECE. The Unit promotes the corporate image of the Commission by managing the corporate sections of its website and ensuring its overall coherence, as well as by designing and producing promotional material on ECE activities. The Unit manages ECE relations with the media, ensures the Commission's presence in social media and provides media monitoring and analysis. It advises the Executive Secretary, senior managers and the staff of ECE on outreach and advocacy.

- 20.37 The amount of \$8,603,600, reflecting a net decrease of \$396,000 compared to the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the financing of 23 posts (1 USG, 1 D-2, 2 D-1, 4 P-5, 3 P-4, 1 P-3, 1 P-2, 1 General Service (Principal level) and 9 General Service (Other level)) and non-post requirements, including for consultants, experts, travel of staff, contractual services and hospitality, to support the implementation of mandates under the programme.
- 20.38 The net decrease of \$396,000 mainly relates to the proposed abolition of one D-1 Principal Economic Affairs Officer post and reductions relating to the phased abolishment of posts approved by the General Assembly in resolution 70/247, off set, in part, by the proposed establishment of a P-4 programme officer post in the Programme Management Unit to strengthen the Commission's evaluation function, in line with the request by the Executive Committee.
- 20.39 During the biennium 2018-2019, extrabudgetary resources estimated at \$67,800, reflecting a minor increase of \$11,300, are related to non-post resources required to implement activities related to the economic empowerment of women in the ECE region, including as a follow-up to the 20-year regional review of the Beijing Programme for Action.

- 20.49 The proposed amount of \$12,210,700, reflecting a decrease of \$11,300 compared to the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the continuation of 39 posts (1 D-1, 4 P-5, 7 P-4, 9 P-3, 5 P-2, 1 General Service (Principal level) and 12 General Service (Other level)), and non-post requirements, including for consultants, and travel of staff to support the implementation of mandates under the programme. The decrease of \$11,300 under non-post requirements results from efficiencies that ECE plans to bring about in 2018-2019.
- 20.50 During the biennium 2018-2019, extrabudgetary resources estimated at \$4,408,900, include \$2,377,600 to provide for 7 posts (3 P-4, 1 P-3, 1 P-2 and 2 General Service (Other level)), and \$2,031,300 under non-post resources that would complement the regular budget resources. The decrease of \$1,200,000 in extrabudgetary resources in 2018-2019 is owing to the fact that some projects were completed in 2016-2017. This also reflects the best estimates of the level of contributions currently anticipated.

The reduction of \$213,700 in extrabudgetary resources for 2018-2019 reflects completion of a number of projects in 2016-2017 and no further funding is anticipated in 2018-2019.

Subprogramme 8 Housing, land management and population

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$2,165,700

20.76 Substantive responsibility for this subprogramme is vested in its two components: (a) housing and land management, in the Forests, Land and Housing Division; and (b) population, in the Statistics Division. The subprogramme will be implemented in accordance with the strategy detailed under subprogramme 8 of programme 17 of the biennial programme plan for the period 2018-2019 (A/71/6/Rev.1).

20.77 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objective and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) adequate national statistical data and information is available on housing, urban development, land management and population issues; (b) there is political will, an adequate legislative and regulatory framework, adequate institutions and sufficient resources to allow member States to implement the recommendations of the Committee on Housing and Land Management; (c) there is political will to support activities that improve the knowledge base and

capacity for designing and implementing population-related policies and programmes; and (d) donor support for the preparation of studies and guidelines and undertaking of country and city profile studies, and for population-related activities is adequate.

20.79 The proposed amount of \$2,165,700, reflecting a decrease of \$2,400 compared to the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the continuation of seven posts (1 P-5, 1 P-4, 2 P-2, 3 General Service (Other level)), and non-post requirements, including for consultants, and travel of staff to support the implementation of mandates under the programme.

Section 20 Economic development in Europe

20.80 During the biennium 2018-2019, extrabudgetary resources estimated at \$523,600 would complement regular budget resources. The projected reduction in extrabudgetary resources of \$371,200 reflects the known and anticipated levels of contributions for existing and continuing projects.

D. Programme support

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$5,844,000

- 20.81 The programme support component comprises the Executive Office and the Information Systems Unit.
- 20.82 The Executive Office is responsible for the coordination, management and provision of general administration services, including coordination, drafting and promulgation of all administrative policies, travel management, enterprise application coordination and management (including Umoja), office space management, organization of procurement activities; human resources management, including staff selection and training, staff performance management, management of the ECE intern programme, management of consultants and individual contractors, staff welfare and information, management of work schedules and flexible work arrangements, financial and budgetary support including, financial processing and support, management of the ECE grants programme, coordination of budget preparation and submission, assists in the coordination of OIOS and external audits, telecommunication expenditure control and other planning and coordination of the ECE secretariat as a whole. In addition to those functions set out in section 7 of the Secretary-General's bulletin ST/SGB/1997/5, as amended by the Secretary-General's bulletin ST/SGB/2002/11, the Executive Office ensures that all United Nations regulations, rules, policies and procedures pertaining to administration and management matters are followed.
- 20.83 The Information Systems Unit ensures that information and communication technology (ICT) systems and services are provided, managed and aligned in support of effective delivery of the ECE programme of work and mandates. The Unit provides management of ICT projects and ensures the analysis and identification of ICT solutions and services for specific systems and applications for ECE subprogrammes. The Unit also manages ICT resources and services in line with United Nations policies, as set out in the information and communications technology strategy for the United Nations (see resolution 69/262) and related ICT standards and requirements, including architecture, policies, procedures, planning and coordination of all information and communications technology resources. It also liaises with service providers and collaborates with other United Nations entities on matters pertaining to information technology, and ensures the effective and efficient capture, storage and dissemination of ECE's organizational knowledge.
- 20.84 The distribution of resources for programme support is reflected in table 20.36 below.

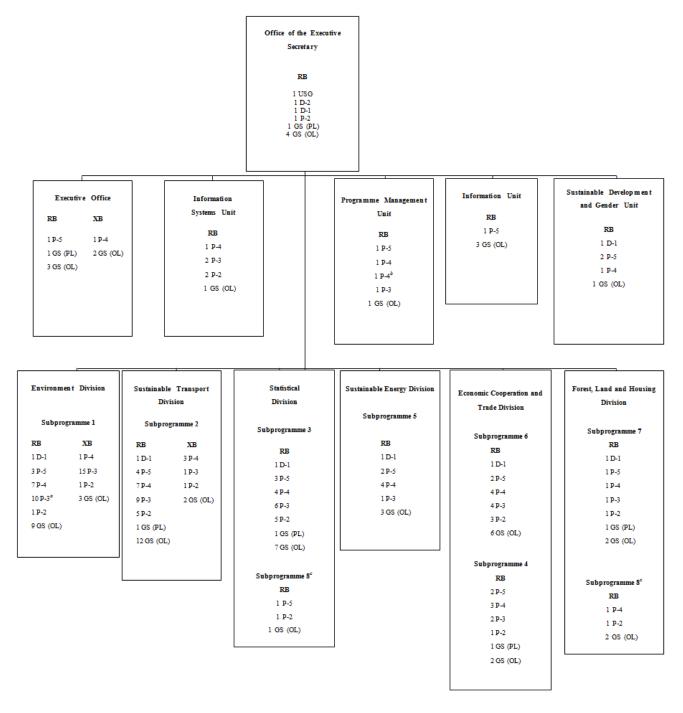

- 20.85 The proposed amount of \$5,844,000, reflecting a net decrease of \$325,700 compared to the appropriation for 2016-2017, would provide for the financing of 11 posts (1 P-5, 1 P-4, 2 P-3, 2 P-2 and 1 General Service (Principal level) and 4 General Service (Other level)), and non-post requirements, including for other staff costs, consultants, contractual services, general operating expenses, and grants and contributions to support the implementation of mandates under the programme. The decrease of \$325,700 mainly relates to proposed abolition of 1 General Staff (Other level) post in the Information Systems Unit resulting from further efficiencies that the Office plans to bring about in 2018-2019, and reductions relating to the phased abolition of 1 General Staff (Other level) post in approved by the General Assembly in resolution 70/247.
- 20.86 During the biennium 2018-2019, extrabudgetary resources estimated at \$3,821,600 include \$947,200 to provide for three posts (i.e. 1 P-4 and 2 General Staff (Other level)) and \$2,874,400 under non-posts resources. The estimated requirements of \$3,821,600 reflect an increase of \$414,000 over the 2016-2017 biennium are to complement the regular budget resources available to the Executive Office in order to provide general temporary assistance administrative backstopping and other services provided by the United Nations Office at Geneva covered under the service-level agreement related to the extrabudgetary activities of ECE, as well as the continued implementation of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), Umoja and the programmatic donor reporting tool during the 2018-2019 biennium.
