#### 30 April

##### Opening of the session

The session will be opened by the Chairman of the Committee on Information.

##### Election of officers

At its organizational session in 1980, the Committee on Information reached an agreement according to which the principal of geographical rotation would be applied to all officers of the Committee, who would be elected for two-year terms. At the beginning of the twenty-ninth session, the Committee will elect a Chairman, three Vice-Chairmen and a Rapporteur to serve for the next two years.

<sup>1</sup> The following wording for the sub-items of the general debate is based on General Assembly resolution 34/182:

(a) Promotion of the establishment of a new, more just and more effective world information and communications order intended to strengthen peace and international understanding and based on the free circulation and wider and better balanced dissemination of information;

(b) Continuation of the examination of United Nations public information policies and activities, in the light of the evolution of international relations and the need to establish the new international economic order and the new world information and communications order;

(c) Evaluation and follow-up of the efforts made and the progress achieved by the United Nations system in the field of information and communications.
