**Review of the implementation of the recommendations
and decisions adopted by the General Assembly at its
tenth special session: Advisory Board on Disarmament
Matters; United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research**

Programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005

Request for a subvention to the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research resulting from the recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the Institute on the work programme of the Institute for 2005

Note by the Secretary-General

Summary

In accordance with the provisions of the statute of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (see resolution 39/148 H, annex, art. VIII, para. 3), the recommendations of the Board of Trustees of the Institute for a subvention for 2005 from the regular budget of the United Nations is hereby transmitted to the General Assembly for approval. In its approval of the programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 (see resolution 58/271 A), an amount of \$561,600 was included under section 4, Disarmament, to finance the subvention for the Institute.

1. At its forty-third session, held from 30 June to 2 July 2004, the Advisory Board on Disarmament Matters, in its capacity as the Board of Trustees of the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR), approved, for submission to the General Assembly, the report of the Director of the Institute on its activities for the period from August 2003 to July 2004 and the proposed programme of work and estimated budget for the biennium 2004-2005 (see A/59/168). The present report, reflecting the updated estimates that have since been provided by the Institute for review by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, is submitted to the Assembly in the context of its consideration of a subvention of \$227,600 for 2005 from the regular budget of the United Nations, to be recosted in accordance with the technical adjustment to the programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 to be submitted to the General Assembly in the context of the first performance report.

2. In the report of the Director of UNIDIR on the activities of the Institute for the period from August 2003 to July 2004, it is stated that the Board strongly appealed for continuation of the subvention and annual cost adjustments. The Board further stressed the subvention for the Institute carried out two vitally important roles. First, it assured the independence of the Director of the Institute and therefore an unbiased research programme, and, secondly, it assisted the Director in raising voluntary funds. The latter function was particularly important under the current cuts in funding for disarmament-related programmes and projects. (A/59/168, para. 6).

3. Section 4, Disarmament, of the programme budget of the United Nations for the biennium 2004-2005 (A/58/6 (Section 4)), as approved by the General Assembly in its resolution 58/271 A of 23 December 2003, contains a provision of \$561,600 representing the United Nations biennial subvention to UNIDIR. Notwithstanding the inclusion of the necessary provision in the programme budget, a formal annual request for a subvention is submitted to the General Assembly, in keeping with established procedure. For 2005, a subvention of \$227,600 is requested, to be adjusted through recosting in the context of the first performance report.

4. Under section IV of General Assembly resolution 44/201 B of 21 December 1989, the Secretary-General was requested to report annually to the Assembly on the situation of the Institute. In this context, the updated financial situation of the Institute (details of which are included in annexes I through IV to the present note) may be summarized as follows:

(a) Funds available at the beginning of 2004 amounted to \$1,108,000. This figure includes an amount of \$250,000 required as an operating cash reserve for 2004;

(b) Total income for 2004 is estimated at \$2,032,500, consisting of: voluntary contributions and public donations (\$1,730,900); other interorganizational contributions (\$24,000); interest income (\$50,000); and the subvention from the United Nations regular budget (\$227,600). Of the total voluntary contributions and public donations, approximately 68 per cent would be used for special projects and 32 per cent for other purposes, including administrative costs;

(c) Total estimated expenditure for 2004 is \$1,977,700, including a provision of \$83,300 for programme support costs. Expenditures for 2005 are estimated at \$2,412,400, inclusive of \$104,200 for programme support costs;

(d) Available funds at the beginning of 2005 are estimated at \$1,162,800, inclusive of an amount of \$312,400 as an operating cash reserve.

5. Should the General Assembly decide to approve the recommendation of the Board of Trustees of UNIDIR, a subvention of \$227,600 for 2005, to be recosted, would be provided to UNIDIR. No additional separate appropriation would be required under section 4, Disarmament, of the programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 to accommodate the subvention.
