ITEM 15 OF THE PROVISIONAL AGENDA

Election of non-permanent members of the Security Council (continued)

1. The PRESIDENT: With the agreement of the General Assembly, I held consultations this morning in my offices regarding the candidatures of five Member States to fill the four vacancies on the Security Council as of 1 January 1965. I should, first of all, like to express my sincere appreciation to all the Members of the General Assembly for their co-operation in following the procedure which I had suggested.
2. As a result of these consultations, may I propose to the General Assembly that it approve without objection that the following three Member States should fill three of the vacancies on the Security Council: Malaysia, the Netherlands, Uruguay.
3. As regards Malaysia, may I recall the arrangement made at the eighteenth session of the General

Assembly to which I referred this morning [1312th meeting], namely, that Malaysia would serve on the Security Council for a period of one year, from 1 January 1965 to 31 December 1965. The Netherlands and Uruguay would serve from 1 January 1965 to 31 December 1966.

4. If there is no objection, I shall take it that the General Assembly agrees to this proposal.

It was so decided.

5. The PRESIDENT: I therefore declare Malaysia, the Netherlands and Uruguay to be members of the Security Council.

6. Concerning the candidatures of Jordan and Mali, I need further consultations in order to be able to make a firm recommendation to the General Assembly. Accordingly, I ask the indulgence of delegations for one more consultation, to be limited to the candidatures of Jordan and Mali.

7. If this is acceptable, I shall adjourn the meeting now and I shall be available in my offices for this consultation between the hours of 10.30 and 11.30 tomorrow morning. I shall then convene the General Assembly at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, at which time I hope to be in a position to propose one of these two States to fill the remaining vacancy on the Security Council. If there is no objection, I shall take it that the General Assembly agrees to this procedure.

It was so decided.

The meeting rose at 3.45 p.m.
