


Missile defense system

THAAD: Terminal High Altitude Area Defense

- THAAD is purely defensive in nature.
- * North Korea's continued pursuit of WMD strike capabilities require defensive measures to be put in place.
- * U.S. ballistic missile defense systems are not designed to negate China or Russia's strategic deterrent.









A Terminal High Altitude Area Defense (THAAD) interceptor is launched from the Pacific Spaceport Complex Alaska in Kodiak, Alaska, during Flight Experiment THAAD-01, July 30, 2017. During the test, the THAAD weapon system successfully intercepted an air-launched, mediumrange ballistic missile target.




