Extensions of ongoing country programmes

Note by the secretariat

Summary

In accordance with Executive Board decision 2009/11, this note informs the Executive Board of the two-month extension of the country programme for Paraguay, and the first one-year extensions of the country programmes for Guatemala, Madagascar and the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, all approved by the Executive Director.

This note further presents the reasons for the proposed two-month extension of the country programme for Cuba, following a previous one-year extension; the proposed two-month extension of the country programme for the Democratic Republic of the Congo, following two one-year extensions; and the proposed ninemonth extension of the country programme for the Syrian Arab Republic, following two previous one-year extensions. The Executive Board is requested to approve these programme extensions.

Draft decision

The Executive Board

- 1. Takes note of the two-month extension of the country programme for Paraguay, and the first one-year extensions of the country programmes for Guatemala, Madagascar and the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, which were approved by the Executive Director and are presented in table 1;
- 2. Approves the two-month extensions of the country programmes for Cuba, following a previous one-year extension, and for the Democratic Republic of the Congo, following two one-year extensions; and the nine-month extension of the country programme for the Syrian Arab Republic, following two previous one-year extensions, as presented in table 2.

Paraguay	2015–2019	February 2020 (two-month extension)	- A two-month extension will enable UNICEF to develop its new CPD in full alignment with the new UNSDCF guidance for Paraguay, which is expected to be finalized towards the end of 2019.
			 Except for marginal alignment of results, strategies, enablers and resources to the Strategic Plan, 2018–2021, the priorities, assumptions and strategies that underpin the current country programme remain unchanged.
Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela	2015–2019	December 2020 (one-year extension)	- A one-year extension will enable UNICEF to design a relevant, fit-for-context CPD and to make a deliberate, meaningful transition to alignment with the logic and content of the new UNSDCF. This will contribute to the overall aid effectiveness of United Nations development cooperation in an evolving country context.

Postponement of the submission of the CPD will ensure that presentation of the CPD by UNICEF is aligned with UNDP, UNFPA and UN-Women, which will all prepare new CPDs in 2020.
Syrian Arab Republic	March 2016–2019 (including two previous one-year extensions)	September 2020 (nine-month extension)	 The Regional United Nations Sustainable Development Group has agreed to extend the current United Nations Strategic Framework for a six-month period, until June 2020, to enable the development of a new two-year interim United Nations Strategic Framework. A nine-month extension of the current CPD will enable UNICEF to align the new CPD with the interim Strategic Framework.
