for the biennium ended 31 December 2013

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Chapter I

Report of the Board of Auditors on the financial statements:

Audit opinion

Report on the financial statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) for the biennium ended 31 December 2013, which comprise the statement of assets, liabilities and reserves and fund balances (Statement II); the statement of income, expenditure and changes in reserve and fund balances (Statement I), the cash flow statement (Statement III), the statement of appropriation (Statement IV), and the schedules and explanatory notes.

Management's responsibility for the financial statements

The Executive Secretary of UNCCD is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the United Nations system accounting standards and for such internal control as management deems necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the

audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Basis for qualified opinion

On 30 September 2013, according to the decision of the Conference of the Parties (COP), the accountability and legal representation of the Global Mechanism (GM), along with \$1.4 million cash were transferred to the UNCCD Secretariat. The accounts were later consolidated into UNCCD's financial statements. However, the amounts consolidated into the UNCCDs financial statements in respect of the Global Mechanism were not subject to audit by the appointed external auditors of the Global Mechanism. Consequently, we have no assurance over the amounts transferred and were unable to determine whether any adjustments to them were necessary.

Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for the qualified opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of UNCCD as at 31 December 2013 and its financial performance and cash flows for the biennium then ended in accordance with the United Nations system accounting standards.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

Further to our opinion, the transactions of UNCCD that have come to our notice, or which we have tested as part of our audit, have in all significant respects been in accordance with the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations and legislative authority.

In accordance with article VII of the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations, we have also issued a long-form report on our audit of the financial statements on UNCCD.

Chapter II

Report of the Board of Auditors (Long-form report)

Summary

The Board of Auditors (the Board) has audited the financial statements and reviewed the operations of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) for the biennium ended 31 December 2013. The audit was carried out at UNCCD's headquarters in Bonn, Germany.

Qualified audit opinion

The Board issued a qualified opinion on the financial statements of UNCCD for the period under review, as reflected in Chapter I. On 30 September 2013, according to the decision of the Conference of the Parties (COP), the accountability and legal representation of the Global Mechanism (GM), along with \$1.4 million cash were transferred to the UNCCD Secretariat. The accounts were later consolidated into UNCCD's financial statements. However, the amounts consolidated into the UNCCDs financial statements in respect of the Global Mechanism were not subject to audit by the appointed external auditors of the Global Mechanism. Consequently, we have no assurance over the amounts transferred and were unable to determine whether any adjustments to them were necessary.

Overall conclusion

During the period under review, UNCCD continued its efforts to maintain sound internal control, enhance accountabilities and promote good governance structures. The Board noted that UNCCD took measures to address our concerns on the selection of consultants and individual contracts, and enhance the preparation of International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) implementation through revising implementation plan and regular meeting to address various issues of IPSAS implementation. However, the Board has identified deficiencies in some areas, particularly that insufficient assurance is available over the accounts transferred from GM, and insufficient preparations for IPSAS implementation such as delays in the finalization of accounting policies and in recruitment of consultant.

Key findings

Progress toward the implementation of International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS)

Preparations for IPSAS implementation were insufficient at the date of audit in April 2014 in that (a) target dates and detailed procedures for key activities were not confirmed including, for example, setting up a steering committee and implementation team with appropriate allocation of authority and duties, training plans for staff involved in implementing IPSAS, and preparing and reviewing a full set of accounting policies in accordance with

IPSAS in the context of UNCCD operations; (b) accounting policies were not finalized; and (c) there were delays in recruitment of consultant and training of staff.

Financial management

As at 31 December 2013, \$2.15 million or 54 per cent of the \$4.01 million assessed contribution receivable was outstanding for more than four years. In addition, the total amount of voluntary contributions received under extrabudgetary funds was \$8.88 million, representing 56 per cent of the total extrabudgetary finance needed in the biennium (\$15.84 million).

The Board recognises the challenge faced by UNCCD in raising funds, and is concerned that the long term outstanding assessments along with inadequate extra-budgetary funding might affect the operations of UNCCD.

Recommendations

The Board has made a number of recommendations based on its audit.

The main recommendations are that UNCCD:

- (a) Revise the implementation plan to ensure targets are set for key activities, and expedite the finalization of accounting policies and the recruitment of consultant as well as the training to key staff so that IPSAS can be implemented in a timely manner;
 - (b) Obtain reliable and independent verification of the accuracy and

completeness of accounting records and balances transferred in respect of the Global Mechanism; and

(c) Expedite its efforts to collect the outstanding assessed contributions and seek to increase fund raising through improved advocacy work, demonstrating and documenting more clearly the "impact chain" of projects and continuous coordination of fund-raising activities with the Global Mechanism.

Follow-up of previous recommendations

Of the nine recommendations made for biennium 2010-2011, three were fully implemented; six were under implementation. Of the six recommendations under implementation, one recommendation relates to biennium 2006-2007, while the other five recommendations relate to biennium 2010-2011. Details of the status of implementation of these recommendations are indicated in the annex to this report.

A. Mandate, scope and methodology

- 1. The Board of Auditors (the Board) has audited the financial statements of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) and has reviewed its operations for the financial biennium from 1 January 2012 to 31 December 2013 in accordance with General Assembly (GA) resolution 74 (I) of 1946. The audit was conducted in conformity with article VII of the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations (UNFRR), as well as the International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that the Board comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.
 - 2. The audit was conducted primarily to enable the Board to form an opinion as to whether the financial statements presented fairly the financial position of UNCCD as at 31 December 2013 and its financial performance and cash flows for the biennium then ended, in accordance with the United Nations system accounting standards (UNSAS). This included an assessment as to whether the expenditures recorded in the financial statements had been incurred for the purposes approved by the governing bodies and whether income and expenditures had been properly classified and recorded in accordance with the UNFRR. The audit included a general review of financial systems and internal controls and a test examination of the accounting records and other supporting evidence to the extent that the Board considered necessary to form an opinion on the financial statements.
 - 3. The Board also reviewed UNCCD operations under United Nations Financial Regulation 7.5 which allows the Board to make observations on the efficiency of the

financial procedures, the accounting system, the internal financial controls and, in general, the administration and management of operations.

4. The present report covers matters that, in the opinion of the Board, should be brought to the attention of the Conference of the Parties (COP). The Board's observations and conclusions were discussed with the UNCCD Secretariat, whose views have been appropriately reflected in the report.

B. Findings and recommendations

1. Follow-up of previous recommendations

- 5. Of the nine recommendations made for biennium 2010-2011, three were fully implemented; and six were under implementation. Of the six recommendations under implementation, one relates to biennium 2006-2007, while the other five recommendations relate to biennium 2010-2011. Details of the status of implementation of these recommendations are in the annex to this report.
- 6. The Board does not have significant concerns on the implementation of these recommendations but encourages the secretariat to intensify its efforts to implement the recommendations as quickly as possible. The Board would like to highlight the following issues:
 - (a) In its previous report, the Board recommended that UNCCD reconcile the discrepancies in NEP's records. In 2012-2013, the Board continues to note discrepancies in NEP's records between the Finance Section and the Asset Management Section,

which amounted to \$0.32 million or 27 per cent of the NEP value disclosed in the financial statements.

- (b) In response to the Board's previous recommendation, UNCCD Secretariat established a guideline in June 2013 stating that in order to reduce the booking cost, all tickets for official travel of staff members and eligible family members should be purchased by the Secretariat at least four weeks in advance of the actual travel. Notwithstanding the issuance of this guidance, the Board continued to note delays in air ticket bookings. For example, of the 82 official missions, air tickets for 70 (89 per cent) journeys were purchased less than four weeks before the actual travel.
- 7. The Board recommends UNCCD reconcile the financial records and property records at least quarterly.
- 8. The Board also recommends UNCCD strictly comply with the guideline of tickets booking to achieve the saving as much as possible.

2. Financial overview

- 9. For the biennium ended 31 December 2013, total income for UNCCD amounted to \$37.65 million, including \$6.86 million from the Trust Fund for Voluntary Financing of the UNCCD Global Mechanism (Fund GMZ), since October 2013 when the balance of GM was transferred from IFAD. The total expenditure amounted to \$32.65 million, including \$1.08 million from the Fund GMZ, resulting in an excess of income over expenditure of \$5 million.
- 10. As at 31 December 2013, total assets amounted to \$20.31 million, while total liabilities were \$14.62 million, and the reserves and fund balance amounted to \$5.69 million. Of the

total assets, \$15.28 million was held in cash, and \$4.01 million related to assessed contribution receivable from member parties. Of the total liabilities, \$12.09 million or 83 per cent was end-of-service and post-retirement liabilities, which is an increase of \$3.15 million compared to the last biennium.

3. Progress towards the implementation of International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS)

- 11. The General Assembly, in its resolution 60/283, approved the adoption of International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) within the United Nations system. In its first extraordinary session (Decision 1/COP.ES-1), the COP endorsed the adoption of IPSAS in UNCCD. The secretariat decided to implement IPSAS alongside the United Nations Secretariat with effect from 1 January 2014.
- 12. During the biennium, the secretariat began preparing for the implementation of IPSAS, including, for example, establishing a joint IPSAS project board of UNCCD and the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), organizing meetings to address various issues of IPSAS implementation, and updating IPSAS implementation plans. However, the Board has identified the following areas for management's attention:
 - Inadequate implementation plans. The revised IPSAS implementation plan does
 not clearly define target dates, key activities or milestones. For example, a
 steering committee and implementation team with appropriate allocation of
 authority and duties has not been established.

- Accounting policies were not finalized. The Secretariat had not identified which IPSAS standards were relevant to UNCCD, nor were IPSAS-compliant accounting policies finalized;
- Delays in recruitment of consultant and training of staff. The Board noted
 that the Secretariat made a provision in the core budget for 2014-2015 to hire a
 consultant to support IPSAS implementation and to provide necessary training
 to Secretariat staff. However, the recruitment of this consultant was not
 initiated and training had not started at the time of audit.
- 13. UNCCD agreed with the Board's recommendation to improve the implementation plan to ensure targets are set for key activities, and to expedite the finalization of accounting policies as well the recruitment of a consultant. Training of key staff would also be accelerated so that IPSAS could be implemented in a timely manner.

4. Global Mechanism

14. The United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) created the Global Mechanism (GM) as a means of mobilizing resources to protect dry land areas. At the First Conference of the Parties of the UNCCD held in October 1997, the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) was selected to house the Global Mechanism by a ministerial-level assembly of over 113 countries that had ratified the Convention. The Global Mechanism has a Collaborative Institutional Arrangement to support it, involving UNDP, IFAD and the World Bank.

15. Based on Decision 6/COP.10, the Conference of the Parties (COP) in October 2011 decided that the accountability and the legal representation of the GM, formerly carried out by the IFAD on behalf of the COP, would be transferred to the UNCCD Secretariat, and that the UNCCD Executive Secretary would assume overall management responsibility, including accounting and reporting of the GM. On 27 September 2013, the COP in its Eleventh Session authorized the Executive Secretary to take all necessary measures to develop the institutional arrangements in an expeditious manner from 1 October 2013, so as to ensure that the administrative, procedural and legal aspects were implemented.

16. According to the trial balance records, the GM had cash balances of \$7.11 million as at 27 September 2013, while net payables due to IFAD were \$0.77 million resulting in a net balance of \$6.34 million relating to GM. Of this net balance: (i) \$1.41 million was transferred to the Fund GMZ of the UNCCD Secretariat, which was established to manage GM related funds, (ii) \$4.58 million was transferred to an escrow account to meet estimated costs of pending legal cases involving former GM staff (\$3.73 million), disputed invoices from the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (\$0.65 million), and a contingency provision (\$0.2 million) and (iii) \$0.35 million was refunded to IFAD to cover travel and other advances relating to UNCCD.

17. IFAD prepared GM's financial statements for the financial year 2012, in which, IFAD included provisions of \$4.84 million for disputed invoices from FAO and appeals filed by current and former GM staff against IFAD. However, in its response to IFAD, the UNCCD Secretariat highlighted that the GM was not a party to the cases before the Administrative Tribunal of the International Labour Organization. In addition, the UNCCD Secretariat was in consultation with FAO regarding the outstanding invoices and their validity. Therefore, on

both counts, the UNCCD Secretariat could not agree to the financial provisions made by IFAD and included in the financial statements. As the UNCCD Secretariat did not agree with the information contained in the GM financial statements for financial year 2012, they were

submitted to the Conference of the Parties unsigned by the UNCCD and unaudited.

18. Additionally, before the transfer of accounting records and the fund balance in September 2013, IFAD and UNCCD had not jointly agreed or verified the final GM balances, nor commissioned an independent audit by a third party, on the financial status and financial

performance of the GM.

19. Consequently, the Board has no assurance on the fair presentation of the net GM balance of \$6,343,788 as at 27 September 2013. The Board has therefore qualified its audit opinion in this respect.

20. The Board recommends that UNCCD obtain reliable and independent verification of the accuracy and completeness of accounting records and balances transferred in respect of the Global Mechanism.

21. At the time of this report, the Board was informed by UNCCD that it has completed a draft of the financial statements of GM that are being considered by IFAD. Furthermore, a negotiation with external auditor has started and the audit will commence once the draft financial statements are finalized.

5. Financial management

Credit card payment

- 22. The Board noted that the UNCCD Secretariat had a credit card under the imprest bank account in Deutsche Bank, in the name of the Coordinator of Administration and Finance Services (AFS). In 2012-2013, the total amount paid through the credit card was \$24,304. All bank reconciliations were certified by the Coordinator of AFS, who was also the holder and certifying officer of the credit card, which is not in line with the rules of segregation of duties.
- 23. The Board noted that procedures for credit card payments were not finalized by the UNCCD Secretariat. AFS restricted use of the card to low-value purchases.
- 24. The Board reviewed supporting documents for all credit card payments above \$1,000 in the biennium, and noted that two purchases of an iPhone (in February 2013) and an iPad (in October 2013) were paid based on instructions from the Executive Director. No Requisition for Procurement, or necessary reviews and approvals were obtained,
- 25. Management explained that in future the UNCCD Secretariat planned to segregate duties and responsibilities so that the credit card holder could not certify and reconcile credit card payments. The Secretariat would also ensure that approvals and relevant supporting documentation are obtained before any procurement was made.
- 26. UNCCD agreed with the Board's recommendation to improve its management on imprest account by: (a) finalizing the internal policy on administration of credit cards as soon as possible and ensure it is strictly followed; and (b) ensuring proper segregation of duties is followed for any credit card payments.

Fund raising

- 27. As at 31 December 2013, the balance of assessed contribution receivable from Member Parties was about \$4.01 million, of which \$2.15 million or 54 per cent had been outstanding for more than four years. Furthermore, of the total assessed contribution (\$19.78 million) in the biennium 2012-2013, \$1.58 million or eight per cent were outstanding.
- 28. In addition, the Board noted that the total amount of voluntary contributions received under extra-budgetary funds was \$8.88 million, far away to the total extra-budgetary finance requested during the biennium (\$15.84 million).
- 29. The Board recognized the challenge of fundraising UNCCD is facing, and is concerned that long term outstanding assessments together with the inadequate extrabudgetary funding might affect the operations of UNCCD.
- 30. UNCCD agreed with the Board's recommendation to expedite efforts to collect the outstanding assessed contributions and seek to increase fund raising through improved advocacy work, demonstrating and documenting more clearly the "impact chain" of projects and continuous coordination of fund-raising activities with the GM.

C. Disclosures by management

31. Management reported to the Board that there were no write-offs of losses of assets, ex gratia payments or causes of fraud or presumptive fraud in UNCCD during the biennium 2012-2013.

D. Acknowledgement

32. The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the cooperation and assistance extended to its staff by the Executive Secretary, as well as the staff members at UNCCD.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1 Statement of Purpose

The permanent Secretariat of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification was established on 1 January 1999 with the following purposes:

- To make arrangements for sessions of the Conference of the Parties (COP) and its subsidiary bodies established under the Convention and to provide them with services as required;
- 2) To compile and transmit reports submitted to it;
- To facilitate assistance to the affected developing country Parties, on request, particularly those in Africa, in the compilation and communication of information required under the Convention;
- To coordinate its activities with the secretariats of other relevant international bodies and conventions;
- 5) To enter, under the guidance of the Conference of the Parties, into such administrative and contractual arrangements as may be required for the effective discharge of its functions;
- To prepare reports on the executions of its functions under this Convention and present them to the Conference of the Parties; and
- To perform such other secretariat functions as may be determined by the Conference of the Parties.

The UNCCD Ten year strategy adopted at COP8 in 2008 has also decided on specific role of the secretariat in order to support Parties in the overall implementation processes of the Strategy (Decision 3/COP.8).

Note 2 Accounting Policies

The following are the significant accounting policies of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD):

(a) Rules and procedures

The accounts of the Convention are maintained in accordance with the Financial Regulations of the United Nations, its own Financial Rules and in conformity with the United Nations System Common Accounting Standards (A/48/530) as recognized by General Assembly resolution 48/216 C of 23 December 1993 and subsequent revisions thereto.

Under the financial procedures adopted by the Conference of the Parties, the Executive Secretary prepares the administrative core budget for the following biennium and submits it to the COP for its consideration and approval. The approved budget constitutes authority to the Executive Secretary to issue allotments, incur obligations and make payments for the purposes for which the appropriations were approved. In the biennium 2012 - 2013, the COP approved a core budget of EUR 16.1 million, of which, the host Government paid EUR 1.0 million. The

remaining amount is to be contributed by all Parties using the indicative scale of contributions which is based on the United Nations scale of assessment.

(b) Accounting conventions

The accounts are prepared on the historical cost basis, modified to the extent that the cost of all property acquired is charged as an expense in the year of purchase, except for the period under review, where property donated in kind by the host Government was valued using the average UN rate of exchange. The UNCCD's accounts are maintained on a "fund accounting" basis. Separate funds for general or special purposes may be established by the Conference of the Parties or the Executive Secretary. Each fund is maintained as a distinct financial and accounting entity, with a separate self-balancing double-entry set of accounts. Starting from COP8, the COP approved the budget in Euro. Previous bienniums' budgets were approved in United States dollars. Additionally, the COP recalled the decision as set out in 1/COP ES-1 to introduce the Euro as the accounting currency in 2010 - 2011.

(c) Contingent liabilities

The expenditures do not include possible costs to cover contingencies under Appendix D to the United Nations staff rules, for personnel financed under resources obtained from contributions. Such costs are covered under contractual arrangements with Van Breda & Co. International.

(d) Unliquidated obligations

Unliquidated obligations are expenditures based on firm obligations entered into, but not disbursed, in the financial period. Unliquidated obligations for the current period in respect of all UNCCD activities remain valid for 12 months following the end of the period to which they relate.

(e) Cash and term deposits

Funds on deposit in interest bearing bank accounts, time deposits and call accounts are shown in the statements of assets and liabilities as cash and term deposits. All cash receipts are held and deposited by the United Nations Office in Geneva (UNOG). UNCCD operates an imprest account in euro to cover certain expenditures in Bonn. All term deposits are made in line with the United Nations investment policies and guidelines.

(f) Income

(i) Assessed contributions from Party members

Income from assessed contributions is recognized on an accrual basis based on the budget approved by the COP. Parties were notified in November 2011 and 2012 of their contributions for 2012-2013 and recorded as receivables, and recognized as income in January of the following calendar year.

(ii) Voluntary contributions

Voluntary contributions to UNCCD trust funds are recorded as income when received, which include funds received under Inter-Organization arrangements.

(iii) Interest income

Interest income includes all interest earned on deposits in various bank accounts, investment income earned on marketable securities and other negotiable instruments and investment income earned in the cash pools. All gains/losses on investments and foreign exchange differences relating to the cash pools are offset against investment income. Investment income and costs associated with the operation of investments in the cash pools are allocated to participating funds.

(iv) Miscellaneous income

Refunds and adjustments of expenditures charged to prior financial periods, net gains on exchange, moneys accepted for which no purpose is specified and proceeds from the sale of surplus property, are credited to miscellaneous income.

(v) Total Income

Secretariat's total income of USD 37.65 million excludes programme support cost income of USD 3.5 million generated from administering of various trust funds, which has been netted off with equivalent expenditures.

(vi) Contributions

All contributions to the Secretariat's activities are deposited with the United Nations Office at Geneva. Imprest accounts in Euro are established for UNCCD to cover expenditures for events organised in Bonn. The utilization of such imprest accounts is reflected in the financial statements.

(g) Translation of currencies

The financial statements of the UNCCD are presented in United States Dollars ("USD"). As per United Nations Accounting standards, transactions in other currencies are recorded in United States Dollars by applying the United Nations operational rates of exchange at the time of the transactions. Realized exchange gains are charged to miscellaneous income and losses are charged to operating expense accounts, respectively. Please see note 2 (b) above regarding the change in accounting currency to Euro.

(h) Reserves and fund balances

As is indicated in note 12, After Service Liabilities, the secretariat accrued the liability for endof-service and post-retirement benefits as of 31 December 2013 based upon the closing instruction from UNOG as well as the actuarial valuation report received from UNHQ New York. In its balance sheet the secretariat has shown under "Reserves and fund balances" two separate sections, one the "Cumulative surplus (deficit)," which is the balance prior to the accrual of the liability for end-of-service and post-retirement benefits, and a separate section, "Cumulative (deficit) -- End-of-service and post-retirement benefits," which reflects the current period and cumulative effect of the accrual of the liability for end-of-service and post-retirement benefits as of each balance sheet date.

(i) The change from UNSAS to IPSAS

The United Nations is transitioning from the use of UNSAS to International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) which will guide presentation of the financial statements of the United Nations, including those of UNCCD, commencing from the 2014 financial year. Hence the present financial statements are the last statements that will be prepared based on UNSAS.

IPSAS are based on full accrual accounting, which means that all assets and liabilities are presented on the face of the financial statements and expenses and revenues are recognized when incurred/earned, irrespective of the cash flows. IPSAS also requires significantly more note disclosures in the financial statements.

Under UNSAS financial accounting and budgetary accounting are aligned. With the adoption of IPSAS, the financial statements will be presented on the full accrual basis, whereas budgetary expenditure will continue to be recorded on a modified cash basis. There will be a reconciliation between budget implementation and the financial statements which will be presented in the notes to the financial statements.

IPSAS requires annual financial statements; commencing from the 2014 financial year, IPSAS-compliant financial statements will be prepared and audited annually.

Note 3 Write-offs and unrealized exchange differences

There were no write-offs recorded during the reporting period. Losses, arising from currency conversion were netted off against exchange gains and dealt with under the income and expenditure statement.

All assets and liabilities held in non-US dollar at the end of the year are revalued at the end of year United Nations official rate of exchange. The resulting revaluation differences are accounted for through the income and expenditure statement.

Note 4 Refunds to Donors

No refund to donors recorded during the biennium 2012-2013.

Note 5 Cost Reimbursable Accounts

Temporary cost reimbursable accounts shall be established for Income and Expenditures for irregular occurrences. During the biennium 2012-2013, a new fund for cost reimbursable

account (ZHC) opened in 2011 in consultation with UNOG/UNHQ to record the income and expenditure account of COP10 and future sessions.

Note 6 Transfer to/from other trust funds

During the biennium 2012-2013, there was a transfer of USD 0.195 million from cost reimbursable accounts (fund ZHC) to trust fund for participation of representatives of State Parties in the session of the UNCCD conference (fund UVA).

Note 7 Cash and term deposits

Except for an imprest bank account in Bonn, Germany, all cash balances are administered and invested by the United Nations in an investment pool. As at 31 December 2013, the cash pools held total assets of USD 9,640.8 million; of this amount USD 15.3 million was due to UNCCD as reflected against the cash pool line in statement II – statements of assets, liabilities, and reserves and fund balances. The table below provides further analysis of the cash balances of UNCCD.

Note 10 Operating and Working Capital Reserve

Operating reserves are established at 15 % (UVA and UWA) of the total annual expenditures under the voluntary general trust funds while an operating reserve for programme support account (ZQA) is maintained at 20 % of annual programme support income earned. A working capital reserve is maintained at 8.3 % of the total approved, annual amount of the core budget

(UXA). The reserves are to cover unforeseen shortfalls, uneven cash flows, unplanned costs and other contingencies. At 31 December 2013 the operating reserve had a balance of USD 0.998 million and the working capital reserve had a balance of USD 0.954 million (Statement II) respectively.

Note 11 Programme support

The programme support at 13 % of the actual expenditures of all established UNCCD trust funds is maintained in a separate account (ZQA), subject to specific exceptions made by the Controller. When a project is shared between UNCCD and another United Nations organization, programme support charges are also shared, accordingly, between both organizations with the combined amount not exceeding 13 %.

Note 12 Non-expendable Inventory

United Nations regulations require the recording and controlling of property or equipment valued at USD 1,500 or more per unit at the time of purchase, property considered to be of an attractive nature and having a minimum value of between USD 500 and 1,500, and group inventory items, irrespective of value. During the biennium acquisitions of such property amounted to USD 36,127, bringing the total value of non-expendable property (NEP) to USD 1.181 million.

Work is ongoing to reconcile this figure with inventory records. In January 2014, the Joint Local Property Survey Board (JLPSB) approved the disposal of obsolete NEP in the amount of USD 277,873.56, which will be reconciled with the amount indicated in the financial statements. Necessary adjustments will be made in the 2014 financial statements. Further disposal and write-off of obsolete, damaged and missing NEP will take place during 2014. The first of these, in the amount of approximately USD 80,000, will be presented to the JLPSB in April 2014.

Note 13 End-of-service and post-retirement benefits

- (a) End-of-service and post-retirement benefits comprise after-service health insurance (ASHI) coverage, repatriation benefits and commutation of unused vacation days. All three liabilities are determined on the basis of an actuarial valuation, which was undertaken by an independent, qualified actuarial firm engaged by United Nations Headquarters.
- (b) After-service health insurance (ASHI)
 - (i) The after-service health insurance (ASHI) is a defined benefit health insurance plan of the United Nations. Upon end-of-service, staff members and their dependants may elect to participate in this plan, provided they have met certain eligibility requirements, including ten years of participation in a United Nations health plan for those who were recruited after 1 July 2007, and five years for those who were recruited prior to this date.
 - (ii) The major assumptions used by the actuarial firm to determine the liabilities for ASHI as at 31 December 2013 were a single equivalent discount rate of 4.47 per cent, a flat

health care yearly escalation rate of 5.0 per cent for non-United States medical plans, and health care escalation rates of 7.3 per cent for all other medical plans, (except 6.3 percent for the United States Medicare plan, and 5.0 per cent for the United States dental plan), grading down to 4.5 per cent over 10 years, and retirement, withdrawal and mortality assumptions consistent with those used by the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund (UNJSPF) in making its own actuarial valuation of pension benefits;

- (iii) Another factor in the ASHI valuation is consideration of contributions by all plan participants in determining the Organization's residual liability. Thus, contributions from retirees are deducted from the gross liability and a portion of the contributions from active staff is also deducted to arrive at the Organization's residual liability in accordance with cost sharing ratios authorized by the General Assembly. These ratios require that the Organization's share shall not exceed one-half for non-US health plans, two-thirds for US health plans, and three-quarters for the Medical Insurance Plan;
- (iv) On the basis outlined in (ii) and (iii) above, the present value of the accrued liability as of 31 December 2013, net of contributions from plan participants for UNCCD, was estimated at USD12.09 million, as per table below.

(v) Further to the assumptions in (ii) above, it is estimated that the present value of the liability would increase by 22 per cent and decrease by 17 per cent if medical cost trend is increased and decreased by 1 per cent respectively, all other assumptions held constant. Similarly, it is estimated that the accrued liability would increase by 23 per cent and decrease by 17 per cent if the discount rate is decreased and increased by 1 per cent respectively, all other assumptions held constant.

(c) Repatriation benefits

- (i) Upon end-of-service, staff members who meet certain eligibility requirements are entitled to a repatriation grant which is based upon length of service, and travel and removal expenses. These benefits are collectively referred to as repatriation benefits.
- (ii) As referred in the above paragraphs, a consulting actuary was engaged to carry out an actuarial valuation of repatriation benefits as of 31 December 2013. The major assumption used by the actuary were a discount rate of 4.5 per cent; and annual salary

increase ranging from 9.1 per cent to 4.0 per cent based on age and category of staff members.

(iii) On the basis of these assumptions, the present value of the accrued liability for repatriation benefits as of 31 December 2013 was estimated at USD1.386 million that is included in the financial statements.

(d) Unused annual leave

- (i) Upon end-of-service, staff members who separate from the organization are entitled to be paid for any unused annual leave that they may have accumulated up to a maximum of sixty working days for those holding fixed term or continuing appointments.
- (ii) As referred to note above, a consulting actuary was engaged to carry out an actuarial valuation of unused vacation days as at 31 December 2013. The major assumption used by the actuary were a discount rate of 4.5 per cent; and an annual rate of increase in accumulated annual leave balances 12.5 days in each of the first three years, 3.0 days per year in the fourth to sixth year. And 0.1 days annually thereafter, capping at an accumulation of 60 days. Salary is assumed to increase annually at rates ranging from 9.1 per cent to 4.0 per cent based on age and category of the staff members.
- (iii) On the basis of these assumptions, the present value of the accrued liability for unused vacation days as of 31 December 2013 was estimated at USD0.615 million that is included in the financial statements.
- (e) The total liabilities for end-of-service and post retirement are as follows:

(f) The aggregate effect of the accrual of the liability for end-of-service and post-retirement benefits is shown on the balance sheet under reserves and fund balances. The cumulative surplus (deficit) line on the balance sheet reflects the surplus (deficit) before the accrual of the liability for end-of-service and post-retirement benefits.

Note 14 Participation in the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund

UNCCD is a member organization participating in the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund (UNJSPF), which was established by the United Nations General Assembly to provide retirement, death, disability and related benefits. The Pension Fund is a funded defined benefit plan. The financial obligation of the organization to the UNJSPF consists of its mandated contribution at the rate established by the United Nations General Assembly together with any share of any actuarial deficiency payments under Article 26 of the Regulations of the Fund. Such deficiency payment are only payable if and when the United Nations General Assembly has invoked the provision of Article 26, following determination that there is a requirement for deficiency payments based on an assessment of the actuarial sufficiency of the Fund as of the valuation date. At the time of this report the United Nations General Assembly has not invoked this provision.

Note 15 Transfer of GM account from IFAD to the UNCCD

In 2013, IFAD transferred a total amount of USD 1,802,217 to the UNOG's account in two instalments. The first transfer in the amount of USD 388,217 was received on 04 September 2013 for the reimbursement of expenses that was pre-financed by the secretariat, and the second transfer in the amount of USD 1,414,000 received on 21 October 2013 as per the table below.

On 21 October 2013, the secretariat received a letter from International Fund for Agricultural (IFAD) stating that IFAD intended to transfer GM funds in the amount of USD 4,575,000 to an escrow account for, inter alia, legal cases involving GM staff (USD 3.7 million) and USD 645,553 for the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) invoices. As a result, IFAD transferred only the balance of GM funds in the amount of USD 1,414,000. Further details on the amounts GM cash balance held by IFAD are provided below.

In late 2010, FAO submitted to the GM outstanding invoices in the amount of USD 645,553 for services undertaken by the Investment Centre of FAO on behalf of the GM in the Latin America and the Caribbean region between 2007 and 2009. As a result of reviewing the documents that had been submitted by the FAO and the follow up discussions that had taken place between the

UNCCD and FAO, the outstanding invoices from the FAO/Investment Centre were considered by the UNCCD to be valid. As a consequence, the Executive Secretary approved payment of the outstanding invoices owed to the FAO/Investment Centre in view of the long standing cooperation with FAO from GM's available resources, which included the remaining balance of funds from the core budget of the GM from the biennium 2012–2013 and the difference funded from the financial resources of the GM in the biennium 2014–2015. Since 31 December 2013, IFAD has returned USD 645,553 to UNCCD from the amount held in escrow by IFAD for GM liabilities.

The UNCCD is exploring the possibility of issuing a payment guarantee for IFAD on the condition that both the UNCCD and IFAD review each case pending before the International Labour Organization Administrative Tribunal (ILOAT) to develop a joint approach to address them. This approach would be formalized in an agreement. IFAD agreed with this approach and stated that through trust and respect between the two organizations the matter could be resolved.

Note 16 Disclosure of donations/contributions in-kind

(i) Services of associate experts were provided by the Governments of Germany and Spain. The approximate cost of these services was USD 0.235 million, as is summarized below:

- (ii) The Government of France contributed an amount of € 100,000 to the consortium Agropolis International for the preparation of the activities of the 3rd UNCCD Scientific Conference.
- (iii) In addition to the above, the secretariat of the UNCCD also receives office premises of 6,078 m2 including office space of 2,494 m2, conference area of 106 m2 and common area of 3,477 m2 in Langer Eugen donated by the Government of Germany. The UNCCD offices are located in 13th, 14th and 15th floors respectively.
