Action plan

1. In accordance with the request made by members of the Security Council on 18 April 2001 at the informal consultations on the final report S/2001/357 of 12 April 2001 of the Panel of Experts on the Illegal Exploitation of Natural Resources and Other Forms of Wealth of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the panel presents its action plan for the extension of its mandate by three months, until the end of July 2001. This action plan is consistent with the one the panel submitted in February 2001 and takes into consideration the views expressed by the Council.

2. The panel wishes to recall that in transmitting the final report and in the action plan submitted in early February, the panel indicated that approximately 70 per cent of the information and work were covered. On this basis, the panel wishes to work on the remaining 30 per cent, mainly on two themes: the activities of criminal cartels and the mining and deals on copper and cobalt. In addition to these two themes, the panel would also compile comments and reactions from various stakeholders and actors cited in the report and prepare answers to those parties.

3. The panel wishes to emphasize that the first theme, "Activities of criminal cartels", covers a wide range of issues all related to the continuation of the conflict. These issues include: money-laundering; counterfeit currency and its use for the purchase of natural resources; financial networks; and arms transactions to support the continuation of the conflict. The second theme is complementary to the work done in the report on numerous deals that were signed by some private companies on copper, cobalt and other natural resources. The panel will work primarily on investigating the stocks of copper and cobalt that existed in some regions of the Democratic Republic of the Congo before the beginning of the war.

Tentative travel plan

4. The panel anticipates that a number of trips to the field would be necessary, some in the region, others outside the region. The aim of these visits would be either to follow up on some of the existing leads or to gather more information on the multiple networks and routes allegedly used for criminal activities. Some visits may also be necessary in the event that new leads appear.
