The Permanent Mission of the Islamic Republic of Iran to the United Nations presents its compliments to the Chairman of the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 (2004) and, in follow-up to the note verbale dated 16 January 2006, has the honour to submit herewith the second report of the Islamic Republic of Iran on the implementation of the Security Council resolution 1540 (2004) (see annex).

### Second report of the Islamic Republic of Iran to the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1540 on the implementation of Security Council resolution 1540 (2004)

This complementary report and its enclosed amended matrix provide additional clarification and information on the national legislation and other legal measures in place in the Islamic Republic of Iran on non-proliferation of weapons of mass destruction (WMD).

**Operative Paragraph 1:** All States shall refrain from providing any form of support to non-State actors that attempt to develop, acquire, manufacture, possess, transport, transfer, or use nuclear, chemical, or biological weapons and their means of delivery;

#### General statement on non-possession of WMD

1. The Islamic Republic of Iran, as a State party to all international legal instruments banning WMD, does not possess WMD and consider these kinds of weapons as inhumane, immoral, illegal, and against its very basic principles.

#### General statement on commitment to disarmament and non-proliferation

2. The Islamic Republic of Iran, as a State party to all international legal instruments banning WMD, in particular as a State party to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT), Biological Weapons Convention (BWC), Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC), and as a member State to the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) and its Comprehensive Safeguards Agreements, firmly advocates non-proliferation and disarmament of WMD.

The Islamic Republic of Iran also believes that non-proliferation and disarmament are mutually reinforcing and efforts directed towards non-proliferation should be paralleled by simultaneous efforts aimed at realization of disarmament.

**Operative Paragraph 2:** all States, in accordance with their national procedures, shall adopt and enforce appropriate effective laws which prohibit any non-State actor to manufacture, acquire, possess, develop, transport, transfer or use nuclear, chemical or biological weapons and their means of delivery, in particular for terrorist purposes, as well as attempts to engage in any of the foregoing activities, participate in them as an accomplice, assist or finance them;

3. In accordance with Article 77 of the Constitution of the Islamic Republic of Iran "International treaties, protocols, contracts and agreements must be ratified by the Parliament". Furthermore, Article 9 of the Civil Code of the Islamic Republic of Iran provides that provisions of all agreements and treaties between the Islamic Republic of Iran and other states as well as international treaties are tantamount to the national law. Such treaties shall enter into force after ratification by the Parliament and executive order of the President to implement them.

In addition to the international treaties and conventions mentioned in the First report, the following treaties, which Iran is a State Party to, are also related to the Security Council 1540 Resolution:

a) Treaty Banning Nuclear Weapon Tests in the Atmosphere, in outer Space and under Water (PTBT-1963) deposited on 5 May 1964,

b) Treaty on the Prohibition of the Emplacement of Nuclear Weapons and Other Weapons of Mass Destruction on the Sea-Bed and the Ocean Floor and in the Subsoil Thereof (Sea-Bed Treaty-1971) deposited on 6 September 1971,

Iran is also a State signatory to the Convention on the Prohibition of Military or Any Other Hostile Use of Environmental Modification Techniques (ENMOD) which was signed in 1977, and the Treaty on Principles Governing the Activities of States in the Exploration and Use of Outer Space (Outer Space Treaty) which was signed in 1967. 4. Biological Weapons Convention (BWC) and Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC) that have been ratified by the Parliament are equivalent to the national laws and violation of their provisions are considered illegal and would be accordingly prosecuted and punished as a criminal offence under the laws currently in force in the Islamic Republic of Iran, particularly the Islamic Penal Code.

Meanwhile as a complementary measure to the implementation of CWC and in order to further consolidate provisions of the national civil and penal codes, the Draft National Legislation for implementation of CWC is under consideration for ratification in the Parliament and is already approved in the related sub-committees and its ratification is due to tack place in the near future.

In accordance with Article 17 of the said Draft, transferring chemicals for use in manufacturing chemical weapons is prohibited and considered as a criminal act. According to Article 32 of the Draft, violators will be sentenced to prison and/or other penalties under the provisions of the Islamic Penal Code. Article 32 of the Draft stipulates that transferring, storage, using and/or threatening to use chemical weapons and/or assisting in such activities are considered as a criminal offence and according to Islamic Penal Code, violators will be convicted to severe punishments including imprisonment. According to Articles 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 of the Draft, all chemicals listed in the schedules 1, 2 and 3 chemicals of CWC should be reported to the Iranian CWC National Authority as the national focal point.

**Operative Paragraph 3**: all States shall take and enforce effective measures to establish domestic controls to prevent the proliferation of nuclear, chemical, or biological weapons and their means of delivery, including by establishing appropriate controls over related materials and to this end shall:

- (a) Develop and maintain appropriate effective measures to account for and secure such items in production, use, storage or transport;
- (b) Develop and maintain appropriate effective physical protection measures;
- (*c*) Develop and maintain appropriate effective border controls and law enforcement efforts to detect, deter, prevent and combat, including through international cooperation when necessary, the illicit trafficking and brokering in such items in accordance with their national legal authorities and legislation and consistent with international law;
- (d) Establish, develop, review and maintain appropriate effective national export and transshipment controls over such items, including appropriate laws and regulations to control

export, transit, trans-shipment and re-export and controls on providing funds and services related to such export and trans-shipment such as financing, and transporting that would contribute to proliferation, as well as establishing end-user controls; and establishing and enforcing appropriate criminal or civil penalties for violations of such export control laws and regulations;

5. There are mandatory measures on accounting for, securing and physically protecting the production, use, storage and transport of nuclear materials, equipment and facilities.

In addition to the laws and regulations mentioned in the First national report, the other relevant laws and regulations, which are in force in the Islamic Republic of Iran, are as follows:

a) The Subsidiary Arrangements to the IAEA Safeguards Agreements with Iran (General Part) which has been in force since 1976 and the modifications to the Subsidiary Arrangements proposed by the Agency which was accepted by Iran on 26 February 2003.

b) Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI) Draft Regulations on the Physical Protection of Installations and Materials, based on IAEA, Document (INFCIRC/225).

c) Article 18 of the Law on the Protection Against Radiation.

d) The membership in the IAEA Data Base, since 1998.

6. According to Articles 19, 20, 21, 22 and 23 of the Draft National Legislation for implementation of CWC, any transfer of materials listed in the schedules 1, 2 and 3 chemicals of CWC needs the authorization of the CWC National Authority and only can take place by prior notification. According to the Article 20 of the Draft, the Customs Administration has the duty to register import-export of the chemicals of the schedules 1, 2 and 3 of CWC and send related figures to the Iranian CWC National Authority.

The chemicals listed in the schedules 1, 2 and 3 chemicals of the CWC are regarded as the control list of dangerous chemical materials and

their precursors. The Iranian CWC National Authority in collaboration with the Ministry of Commerce and the Customs Administration is responsible for controlling the export of chemicals in the said list.

7. In addition to the regulations and measures regarding export controls and combating illegal trafficking of WMD related equipment and materials in the territory of the Islamic Republic of Iran, certain provisions are inserted into bilateral co-operation agreements and treaties between the Islamic Republic of Iran and other respective states.

a) Articles 16 and 18 of the Fundamental Treaty on the Mutual Relations and Principles for Co-operation between the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Russian Federation, ratified by the parliament on 6 January 2002, contain such provisions.

b) Articles 6, 7 and 8 of the Agreement for Co-operation on the Peaceful Uses of Nuclear Energy between the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Democratic Republic of China, ratified by the Parliament on 13 April 1993, deals, among others, with issues like non-proliferation, physical protection, transportation and prevention of illegal access and use of nuclear materials, related materials and equipment are transferred between the two countries.

8. It is worth mentioning that according to the Act of the Ratification of the Basel Convention on the Control of Transboundary Movements of Hazardous Wastes and Their Disposal dated 1992, the Organization for the Protection of the Environment of the Islamic Republic of Iran is the responsible body to implement the Basel Convention. The Customs Administration is bound to get authorization from the Department of Environment (DOE) for transporting all items listed in the appendixes of the Basel Convention.

9. According to the Islamic Penal Code (Article 688) and the provisions that are currently applied by the Ministry of Health and Medical Treatment and Education, activities relating to production, use, import and transportation of pathogenic microorganisms which threaten or put in jeopardy the public health are regarded as offence and punishable act. In this context, the Ministry of Health and Medical Treatment and Education adopted the guidelines on early warning, epidemic preparedness and outbreak response in 2002.

10. With regard to the non-proliferation and disarmament of Biological Weapons and the related materials, the Islamic Republic of Iran has implemented the Plant Protection Act since 1967. The Plant Protection Organization (PPO), established by the Act and works under the supervision of the Ministry for Agriculture, controls animal diseases and is active in public awareness.

**Operative Paragraph 6:** Recognizes the utility in implementing this resolution of effective national control lists and calls upon all Member States, when necessary, to pursue at the earliest opportunity the development of such lists;

#### 11. Sub-paragraph 7(iv) of the First report should be amended as follows:

"The Islamic Republic of Iran has incorporated the list of chemicals annexed to the Chemical Weapons Convention, to its 1993 Law on Export-Import Regulations in the form of 11 digit tariff codes. Customs Administration of the Islamic Republic of Iran is responsible to supervise the importation and exportation of such chemicals."

#### **Operative Paragraph 8:** all States:

(a) To promote the universal adoption and full implementation, and, where necessary, strengthening of multilateral treaties to which they are parties, whose aim is to prevent the proliferation of nuclear, biological or chemical weapons;

(b) To adopt national rules and regulations, where it has not yet been done to ensure compliance with their commitments under the key multilateral nonproliferation treaties;

#### Nuclear Weapons Free Zones/Protocol(s)

12. The Islamic Republic of Iran is a firm advocate of the regional Nuclear-Weapon-Free-Zone (NWFZ) in the Middle East. Indeed, it was the initiative of Iran that first proposed to the United Nations the establishment of a Middle East NWFZ in 1974. Subsequently, the United Nations General Assembly in its Twenty-ninth session adopted the first

resolution (3262(XXIX)) on the establishment of a NWFZ in the region of the Middle East on 9 December 1974.

Since 1980, this resolution has been continuously adopted in the General Assembly by consensus. Realization of a NWFZ treaty to cover the region of Middle East has been an unfulfilled objective due to the rejection of Israel to join the NPT and to put its clandestine nuclear facilities under the IAEA full scope safeguards.

#### Sub-paragraph 8(a)

13. In order to promote the universal adoption and full implementation and strengthening of multilateral treaties in the field of non-proliferation of WMD, the Islamic Republic of Iran introduced to Sixtieth session of the UN General Assembly a new resolution entitled "Follow–up to nuclear disarmament obligations agreed in the 1995 and 2000 Review Conference of the Parties to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons". This resolution (60/72), adopted by the General Assembly on 8 December 2005, urges the States parties to the NPT to follow up on the implementation of nuclear disarmament obligations under the Treaty.

Furthermore, the Islamic Republic of Iran is the sponsor of the resolution (59/67 of 3 December 2004) entitled "Missiles", according to which the UN General Assembly is "convinced of the need for a comprehensive approach toward missiles, in a balanced and non-discriminatory manner, as a contribution to international peace and security".
