

Inputs from the Government of India on the implementation of Security Council resolution 1540 (2004) on weapons of mass destruction and non-State actors

The Government of India has since the submission of its report on implementation 1. of the UNSC Resolution 1540 in November 2004 (S/AC.44/2004/(02)/62), taken additional steps to further strengthen its existing legislative and regulatory mechanism for exercising controls over weapons of mass destruction and their related materials with the view that these do not fall into the hands of non-state actors or unscrupulous elements. A brief summary of the same was forwarded to the Chairman of the Resolution established pursuant 1540 vide letter No. Committee to NY/PMI/152/04/2004 of 16 January 2006.

2. The Weapons of Mass Destruction and Their Delivery Systems (Prohibition of unlawful Activities) Act, an overarching legislation that deals in a comprehensive and coordinated manner with respect to chemical, biological and nuclear weapons and their delivery systems and related materials, equipment and technologies, was enacted in June 2005. Contravention of the provisions of this Act are also punishable under various laws such as the Indian Penal Code 1860, the Explosives Act, 1884, the Explosives Substances Act 1906, the Arms Act, 1959, the Atomic Energy Act, 1962, the Unlawful Activities Act, 1986, Foreign Trade (Development and Regulation) Act, 1992 and the Chemical Weapons Convention Act 2000.

3. Enclosed herewith are clarifications sought by UNSCR 1540 Committee in the Matrix format.
