# Financial support for the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea by the Federal Republic of Germany

Germany is pleased to present the States parties with some information regarding its financial support for the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea based upon the headquarters agreement and its supplementary agreement. The German budget for the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (budget years 1997-2009) can be seen below:

The figures above show that since 1997, Germany has allocated a total sum of 53,090,772.89 euros for the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea. The figures running into the tens of millions between 1998 and 2000 result from the construction of the building for the Tribunal. The figures do not include the assessed contributions to the regular budget of the Tribunal, which are separate, nor do they include the financial contributions made by the city of Hamburg in the past for the Tribunal.
