**Qatar**

Member States in regions of conflict should be requested to submit reports containing data for the Register on a more frequent schedule than once a year.

States exporting nuclear equipment should be required to provide the names of the countries to which such equipment is exported in order to facilitate record-keeping and the monitoring of any attempts to develop nuclear systems in those countries.

We stress that the data submitted by Member States must be analyzed and compared, particularly with regard to country of origin (exporting State), in order to try to limit frequent transfers of weapons by countries to certain other countries, thus exacerbating tensions and inflaming ongoing conflicts in the territories of importing States.
