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NOTE

The resolutions and decisions of the General Assembly are identified as follows:

Regular sessions

Until the thirtieth regular session, the resolutions of the General Assembly were identified by an arabic numeral followed by a roman numeral in parentheses indicating the session (for example: resolution 3363 (XXX)). When several resolutions were adopted under the same number, each of them was identified by a capital letter placed between the two numerals (for example: resolution 3367 A (XXX), resolutions 3411 A and B (XXX), resolutions 3419 A to D (XXX)). The decisions were not numbered.

Since the thirty-first session, as part of the new system adopted for symbols of General Assembly documents, resolutions and decisions have been identified by an arabic numeral, indicating the session, followed by an oblique stroke and another arabic numeral (for example: resolution 31/1, decision 31/301). When several resolutions or decisions were adopted under the same number, each of them has been identified by a capital letter placed after the two numerals (for example: resolution 31/16 A, resolutions 31/6 A and B, decisions 31/406 A to E).

Special sessions

Until the seventh special session, the resolutions of the General Assembly were identified by an arabic numeral followed, in parentheses, by the letter "S" and a roman numeral indicating the session (for example: resolution 3362 (S-VII)). The decisions were not numbered.

Since the eighth special session, resolutions and decisions have been identified by the letter "S" and an arabic numeral indicating the session, followed by an oblique stroke and another arabic numeral (for example: resolution S-8/1, decision S-8/11).

Emergency special sessions

Until the fifth emergency special session, the resolutions of the General Assembly were identified by an arabic numeral followed, in parentheses, by the letters "ES" and a roman numeral indicating the session (for example: resolution 2252 (ES-V)). The decisions were not numbered.

Since the sixth emergency special session, resolutions and decisions have been identified by the letters "ES" and an arabic numeral indicating the session, followed by an oblique stroke and another arabic numeral (for example: resolution ES-6/1, decision ES-6/11).

In each of the series described above, the numbering follows the order of adoption.

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A. Elections and appointments

61/401. Appointment of the members of the Credentials Committee

At its 1st plenary meeting, on 12 September 2006, the General Assembly, in accordance with rule 28 of its rules of procedure, appointed a Credentials Committee for its sixty-first session consisting of the following Member States: CHINA, GUYANA, KENYA, MADAGASCAR, MONACO, PERU, RUSSIAN FEDERATION, TONGA and UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

61/402. Election of five non-permanent members of the Security Council

At its 32nd and 49th plenary meetings, on 16 October and 7 November 2006, the General Assembly, in accordance with Article 23 of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 142 of the rules of procedure of the Assembly, elected BELGIUM, INDONESIA, ITALY, PANAMA and SOUTH AFRICA as non-permanent members of the Security Council for a two-year term of office beginning on 1 January 2007 to fill the vacancies occurring on the expiration of the terms of office of ARGENTINA, DENMARK, GREECE, JAPAN and the UNITED REPUBLIC OF TANZANIA.

61/403. Extension of the term of the ad litem judges of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Genocide and Other Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of Rwanda and Rwandan Citizens Responsible for Genocide and Other Such Violations Committed in the Territory of Neighbouring States between 1 January and 31 December 1994

At its 45th plenary meeting, on 2 November 2006, the General Assembly decided to endorse the recommendation of the Secretary-General,¹ which was endorsed by the Security Council in its resolution 1717 (2006) of 13 October 2006, that, notwithstanding the provisions of article 12 ter of the statute of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Genocide and Other Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of Rwanda and Rwandan Citizens Responsible for Genocide and Other Such Violations Committed in the Territory of Neighbouring States between 1 January and 31 December 1994, the term of office of the following ad litem judges at the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda be extended until 31 December 2008:

At its 41st plenary meeting, on 26 October 2006, the General Assembly decided to authorize the Executive Board of the International Research and Training Institute for the Advancement of Women, a subsidiary organ of the Assembly, to meet in New York during the main part of the sixty-first session of the Assembly, on the strict understanding that the meeting would have to be accommodated when facilities and services could be made available without adversely affecting the activities of the Assembly and its Main Committees.²¹

61/502. Organization of the sixty-first session

At its 2nd plenary meeting, on 13 September 2006, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee as set forth in its first report,²² adopted a number of provisions concerning the organization of the sixty-first session.

At its 51st plenary meeting, on 10 November 2006, the General Assembly, on the proposal of its President, decided, without setting a precedent, to invite the President of the Human Rights Council to present the first annual report of the Council.²³

At the same meeting, the General Assembly, at the request of the Chairman of the Sixth Committee, decided to extend the work of the Committee by one additional meeting.

At its 65th plenary meeting, on 4 December 2006, the General Assembly, at the request of the Chairman of the Second Committee, decided to extend the work of the Committee until Wednesday, 6 December 2006.

At its 69th plenary meeting, on 7 December 2006, the General Assembly, at the request of the Chairman of the Second Committee, decided to further extend the work of the Committee until Friday, 8 December 2006.

At its 70th plenary meeting, on 8 December 2006, the General Assembly, on the proposal of its President, decided, without setting a precedent, to invite the Executive Director of the United Nations Children's Fund to make a statement on the occasion of the special commemorative meeting devoted to the sixtieth anniversary of the operations of the Fund.

At its 41st plenary meeting, on 26 October 2006, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee as set forth in its third report,²⁹ decided that agenda item 68 entitled “Report of the Human Rights Council” would be considered in plenary meeting and in the Third Committee, on the understanding that the Third Committee would consider and act on all recommendations of the Human Rights Council to the Assembly, including those that dealt with the development of international law in the field of human rights, that the Assembly in plenary meeting would consider the annual report of the Human Rights Council on its activities for the year, and that the current arrangement would in no way be a reinterpretation of resolution 60/251 of 15 March 2006 and would be reviewed before the beginning of the sixty-second session of the Assembly, on the basis of the experience gained with the efficiency and practicality of the arrangement.
