The Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects

Programme budget implications of draft resolution A/C.1/58/L.1/Rev.1

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

1. At its 23rd meeting, on 6 November 2003, the First Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.1/58/L.1/Rev.1. A statement on the programme budget implications of the draft resolution was before the Committee in document A/C.1/58/L.56.

I. Requests contained in the draft resolution

2. Under the terms of operative paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 8, 9, 10, 11, 13 and 14 of draft resolution A/C.1/58/L.1/Rev.1, the General Assembly would:

(a) Decide to convene a United Nations conference to review progress made in the implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects in New York for a period of two weeks between June and July 2006;

(b) Also decide that a session of the preparatory committee for the conference would be held in New York for a period of two weeks in January 2006 and that, if necessary, a subsequent session may be held;

(c) Further decide to convene in 2005 the second biennial meeting of States, as stipulated in the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the

Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects, in order to consider national, regional and global implementation of the Programme of Action;

(d) Decide to establish an open-ended working group, to meet in three sessions of two weeks each in duration, to negotiate an international instrument to enable States to identify and trace, in a timely and reliable manner, illicit small arms and light weapons;

(e) Also decide that the open-ended working group would hold an organizational session in New York on 3 and 4 February 2004 in order to set the dates for its substantive sessions;

(f) Request the Secretary-General to provide the open-ended working group with the assistance and services that might be required for the discharge of its tasks;

(g) Also request the Secretary-General to hold broad-based consultations, within available financial resources and with any other assistance provided by Member States in a position to do so, with all Member States, interested regional and subregional organizations, international agencies and experts in the field, on further steps to enhance international cooperation in preventing, combating and eradicating illicit brokering in small arms and light weapons, taking into consideration the views of States provided to the Secretary-General, and to request the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its fifty-ninth session on the outcome of his consultations;

(h) Further request the Secretary-General to continue to collate and circulate data and information provided by States on a voluntary basis, including national reports, on the implementation by those States of the Programme of Action, and encourage Member States to submit such reports;

(i) Request the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its fifty-ninth session on the implementation of the resolution.

II. Relationship of the requests to the programme of work for the biennium 2004-2005

3. The activities referred to above would fall under programme 2, Disarmament, and programme 6, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs, of the medium-term plan for the period 2002-2005, as revised by the General Assembly.¹

III. Activities by which the requests would be implemented

4. Pursuant to operative paragraphs 1 and 2 of draft resolution A/C.1/58/L.1/Rev.1, the Department for Disarmament Affairs would provide the substantive services necessary for the convening of the United Nations conference and its preparatory committee.

5. Pursuant to operative paragraph 3, the Department for Disarmament Affairs would provide the substantive services necessary for the convening of the second biennial meeting of States, as stipulated in the Programme of Action, to consider national, regional and global implementation of the Programme of Action.

6. Pursuant to operative paragraphs 8 to 10, the Department for Disarmament Affairs would serve as the substantive secretariat of the open-ended working group, providing such assistance and services as may be required for the group to discharge its tasks. It is envisaged that the open-ended working group would hold its first substantive session in 2004 and two subsequent sessions in 2005.

7. Pursuant to operative paragraph 11, the Department for Disarmament Affairs would collect the views of States and would organize and service, in 2004, a one-day informal consultation in New York and one in Geneva with Member States and relevant civil society organizations. In addition, a number of regional and subregional meetings would be organized in collaboration with interested regional and subregional organizations. Furthermore, the Department would prepare the report of the Secretary-General on the outcome of the broad-based consultations to be submitted to the General Assembly at its fifty-ninth session.

8. Pursuant to operative paragraph 13, the Department would continue to dedicate staff resources to the receipt, collation and circulation of data and information provided by States, on a voluntary basis, including national reports, on the implementation by those States of the Programme of Action. This would require the continuous maintenance and updating of the computerized database containing the data and information submitted.

9. Pursuant to operative paragraph 14, the Department would prepare, in 2004, the report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of the resolution.

IV. Modifications required in the programme of work and the programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005

10. In order to take into account the provisions of the draft resolution, the narrative of section 4, Disarmament, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 (A/58/6 (Sect. 4)) would be modified to amend the outputs already foreseen in respect of small arms and light weapons issues. Subject to a decision of the General Assembly at its fifty-eighth session, that narrative will be incorporated into the programme of work of section 4 of the programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005. The required modifications are as follows:

Paragraph 4.33 (a)

Under servicing of intergovernmental and expert bodies, add the following:

“(iv) Second biennial meeting of States to consider the national, regional and global implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects;

“(v) Open-ended working group to negotiate an international instrument to enable States to identify and trace, in a timely manner, illicit small arms and light weapons.”

Under parliamentary documentation, add: “report on the outcome of the broad-based consultations on further steps to enhance international cooperation in preventing, combating and eradicating illicit brokering in small arms and light weapons (1)”

Paragraph 4.33 (b)

Under other substantive activities, add the following as new subparagraph (viii) and, accordingly, renumber current paragraph (viii) as (ix):

“(viii) Broad-based consultations with all Member States, interested regional and subregional organizations, international agencies and experts in the field on further steps to enhance international cooperation in preventing, combating and eradicating illicit brokering in small arms and light weapons (regular budget and extrabudgetary)”.

V. Additional requirements**A. Conference-servicing requirements**

11. The conference-servicing requirements, at full cost, for the second biennial meeting of States to consider the implementation of the Programme of Action to Prevent, Combat and Eradicate the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects at the national, regional and global levels, referred to in operative paragraph 3 of the draft resolution, are estimated at \$270,700. The conference-servicing requirements, at full cost, for the organizational session and the three substantive sessions of the open-ended working group referred to in operative paragraphs 8 to 10 of the draft resolution are estimated at \$1,230,800. The conference-servicing requirements, at full cost, for the broad-based consultations related to the request contained in operative paragraph 11 of the draft resolution are estimated at \$20,800. Consequently, should the General Assembly adopt the draft resolution, an additional appropriation of \$1,522,300 would be required for conference-servicing costs.

B. Non-conference-servicing requirements

12. Staff resources under section 4, Disarmament, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 are fully committed to the activities outlined there. It is also expected that the bulk of the work related to the preparation and organization of the first session of the preparatory committee for the United Nations conference, which is to be held in January 2006, will have to be carried out in 2005. In addition, the Department for Disarmament Affairs will have to undertake the preparations for the substantive servicing of the second biennial meeting of States to consider the national, regional and global implementation of the Programme of Action. Furthermore, it is foreseen that negotiations related to the international instrument referred to in operative paragraph 8 of the draft resolution will be complex and will require considerable substantive support from the Department. As the substantive secretariat of the open-ended working group, the Department will be required to prepare, organize and service it. In particular, the Department will be required to provide expertise in addressing the issues to be negotiated within the working group and to prepare the final report and other documentation. Therefore, additional temporary assistance resources equivalent to 18 work-months at the P-3 level and 12 work-months at the General Service (Other level) level would be required for the Department as a consequence of operative paragraphs 8 to 10 of the draft resolution.

13. With respect to the broad-based consultations referred to in operative paragraph 11 of the draft resolution, it is expected that the related requirements will be funded mainly through extrabudgetary resources.

14. Accordingly, the additional non-conference-servicing requirements are estimated at \$371,000, broken down as follows: \$254,200 under section 4, Disarmament, \$69,700 under section 29D, Office of Central Support Services, and \$47,100 under section 32, Staff assessment, offset by an equivalent amount under income section 1, Income from staff assessment. The details of these requirements are as follows (in United States dollars):

15. The additional requirements for the implementation of the programme of work outlined in paragraphs 11 and 14 above are estimated at \$1,893,300.

C. Other

16. With regard to the conference referred to in operative paragraph 1 of the draft resolution, to be convened no later than 2006, as well as its preparatory committee, it is not possible at this point to estimate the related conference-servicing and non-conference-servicing requirements. If the General Assembly adopts the draft resolution and a mandate is given for the convening of such a conference and the subsequent sessions, the necessary resource requirements would have to be reflected in the context of the budget outline and the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2006-2007.

VI. Potential for absorption during the biennium 2004-2005

17. No provision has been made under the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 in relation to the activities that would be requested under operative paragraphs 2, 3, 8, 9 and 10. At this stage it is not possible to identify activities within section 4, Disarmament, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 that could be terminated, deferred, curtailed or modified during the biennium. Consequently, should the General Assembly adopt draft resolution A/C.1/58/L.1/Rev.1, additional requirements would arise under sections 2, General Assembly affairs and conference services, 4, Disarmament, and 29D, Office of Central Support Services, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005.

VII. Contingency fund

18. It will be recalled that, under the procedures established by the General Assembly in its resolutions 41/213 of 19 December 1986 and 42/211 of 21 December 1987, a contingency fund is established for each biennium to accommodate additional expenditures derived from legislative mandates not provided for in the approved or proposed programme budget. Under that procedure, if additional expenditures are proposed that exceed the resources available from the contingency fund, the activities concerned can be implemented only through the redeployment of resources from low-priority areas or the modification of existing activities. Otherwise, such additional activities must be deferred to a later biennium.

VIII. Summary

19. **Accordingly, should the General Assembly adopt draft resolution A/C.1/58/L.1/Rev.1, that decision would give rise to additional requirements for the biennium 2004-2005 under section 2, General Assembly affairs and conference services; section 4, Disarmament; section 29D, Office of Central Support Services; and section 32, Staff assessment. No provisions were made under the aforementioned sections of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005 to cover the additional requirements.**

20. **Consequently, an additional provision of \$1,893,300 would be required over and above the resources proposed in the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2004-2005. That provision would represent a charge against the contingency fund and, as such, would require appropriations for the biennium as follows (in United States dollars):**
